YOUR VOICE.

Learn to Pitch, Moderate and Manage It Properly.

Harper's Bazar, referring to the voices of Americans, makes these pertinent remarks: "In spite of the vast amount of perhaps kindly meant criticism which has been made in all quarters of late years regarding the American voice it certainly does not improve. It is the exception to find, especially in the middle west, an agreeable voice, and women are more faulty than men in this respect. It is urged that the rattle of the cars and the noises of all descriptions make it impracticable to use a smooth, pleasant intonation. One has to force a nasal tone, we are told, in order to be heard in the tumult which 'civilization' has raised around us. When one considers the charm which a sweet voice gives to its possessor one wonders at the general neglect of measures to obtain it. Complexions fade, dentists ruin beautiful mouths, the eyes lose their glow, the chin and the neck crease and bulge—but the speaking voice shares with the nose the distinction of earthly immortality. It may weaken or crack somewhat with advanced age, but a thrilling speaking voice never wholly loses its power. Every one should determine that she will learn to pitch and modulate and manage her voice properly. Nearly every one has it in her power if she only chooses to attend to it."

COOKING OLD FOWLS.

Dishes For Which They Are Better Adapted Than Young Birds.

Almost every housekeeper has been mortified and annoyed by a fine, plump fowl turning out so tough that the carver has found it next to impossible to serve it in the usual way, but not so many of them have discovered that if properly cooked an old bird is much better in some dishes than a young one. For soup, croquettes, timbales, rissoles, fricassée, pie or pates an old fowl, having more flavor and substance, is much better than a chicken. For curried fowl, too, the bird no longer in its tender days is to be preferred, but the meat should be very slowly stewed until tender before using it in any of these dishes. Occasionally one prefers to serve the fowl whole, and even in this way it is quite possible to make a toothsome dish of it if it is cooked with judgment. Have it trussed as for roasting, put it into a saucepan and cover with cold water, let it come slowly to the boiling point, skim well and let it cook very slowly for an hour and a quarter or an hour and a half. Take it out of the water, and let it cool a little, and then stuff it in the crop with any preferred forcement.—Boston Cooking Magazine.

KITCHEN HELPS.

Coarse salt and vinegar will clean enameled ware that has been burned or discolored.

Do not drop dirty, greasy dish towels in hot soapsuds. It only sets the grease. Wash them first in lukewarm water.

An old bookcase set on the kitchen table, back to the wall, makes a very respectable imitation of a kitchen cabinet and saves many steps.

The range should be so located as to escape a draft sweeping over it. A gas range should always have a firm connection. A hood placed over the range is a great ventilator.

When tins are hard to wash, where food has burned on, like baked fish or oatmeal, put the dish on the stove, filled with cold water and half a teaspoonful of baking soda, and let it boil, and your dish will wash, and the odor of fish will be gone.

The Uses of Responsibility.

Every mother should remember that the making of her daughter is of far greater importance than the administration of things in her house, and every daughter should realize that she can learn to avoid mistakes only when she sees them. She enjoys most seeing that when she has a house she will "never do so." A beginning may be made with a small and comparatively unimportant responsibility, suggests Woman's Life, and it is to be remembered that responsibility is not mere work is the great thing. The very little girl may have the care of one plant, a hardy one, to begin with, but system and neatness may be practiced in its care to great advantage. If the plant should be a blooming one a small vase for the breakfast table would give an additional bit of care and pleasure to both child and parents.

Coffee, Chinese Style.

The Chinese method of infusing coffee in cold water is said to eliminate the tannic element. This method may be tried as a culinary experiment. The coffee will be found very strong and of a rich flavor. Put the usual amount of coffee, ground very fine, into cold water in a glass fruit jar. Cover tightly and let stand overnight. In the morning loosen the cover and set the jar in a vessel of hot water. Let the water boil until the coffee is piping hot, when strain into a hot coffeepot and send to the table. If wanted for after dinner coffee make the infusion early in the morning.

The Kitchen Table.

A zinc covered table is a convenience in the kitchen, as hot things can be set directly on to it, and it is easy to keep clean. Pine top tables look spick and span when they are scrubbed carefully, but that means a constant expenditure of strength and time. Tables with hardwood tops covered with kitchen oilcloth save a great deal of time and labor.
