

The citizens of Graham are seriously considering erecting a municipal electric light plant. The lights have been furnished the town for several years by the Bluestone Traction Company, under a franchise which will expire next June. A renewal of the franchise is being held up in the town council until the people decide the municipal proposition. The Bluestone Traction Company operates street cars between Graham and Bluefield, and have been petitioned by the people of west Graham to extend the line into that community, but it is understood that the proposition has been flatly refused by the company, as from a business standpoint it would not be advisable for them to extend the line at present.

Large Coal Shipment.

The Clinchfield Fuel Company will commence to ship off the Dump's Creek extension of the Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio this week. It is expected that the first loaded car will go over the road on Friday. The Clinchfield Coal Corporation, which sells through the fuel company, has five drift mines and one shaft on the Dump's Creek extension and it is possible that three more openings may be made from which coal will be shipped.

In addition to these mines the company has mines at Dante and Geogel and on one day last week, according to the Telegraph, the company loaded 5,377 tons of coal. This made a total of 108 cars which were shipped that day and this in spite of the fact that active operation has only been going on for the past eighteen months.

The company expect to ship 2,000,000 tons of coal this year and if its plans are all carried out it will have four millions inside of five years.

The Clinchfield people own over 290,000 acres of coal lands in that section.
