RUSSIAN SENTIMENT ON VODKA

One official of Russia, who has not hesitated to speak frankly and highly of the effects of prohibition in Russia is the Minister of Finance. We wonder that our anti-prohibition contemporaries have not taken note of this fact, as it is their favorite cry that the financial interests of every

government opposes prohibition as dangerous to a well balanced financial system. In discussing the financial situation, Pierre L. Bar, Minister of Finance, recently said:

"Notwithstanding the depressing and paralyzing effect of the war, the Russian peasant class is more prosperous than at any previous time in the history of the country."

"It is not difficult to account for this unusual prosperity. By virtue of the allowance made by the government to the families of soldiers, which exceeded the earning power of the soldiers, the total income of these families is greater than in times of peace."

"It is prohibition of the sale of vodka which is primarily responsible for the ameliorated condition of the peasant," he responded. "The increase through which all the available earnings formerly disappeared has either been closed, and the money is either spent for present necessities or saved for future wants."

In response to the question regarding the recent increase of 30 per cent in the tariff, Mr. Bar said:

"That is only a temporary affair, designed partly to make up for the loss in revenue from the vodka traffic."

Mr. Bar was asked what means were being employed to replace the revenue formerly derived from vodka.

"The amount of this revenue exceeded \$450,000,000," he replied. "This is being replaced in a diversity of ways, including a special war tax on railroad transportation, matches, sugar and the most commodious."

How much better is it to derive revenue from legitimate sources than from the destruction of the manhood of a nation!—Richmond Virginian.
