ZIMMIS ACQUITTED OF MURDER CHARGE.

(Graham Banner.) The case of the Commonwealth against M. Z. Zimmis was tried at Lebanon last week in the Circuit court, and after being out a few minutes the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty.

It will be remembered that on last Christmas eve a young man by the name of Combs was killed in the Sutherland store at Finney. Zimmis was the telegraph operator at that point and was in the store at the time of the killing.

He was arrested and had been held in the Lebanon jail ever since. It is said that many witnesses appeared at the trial against Zimmis.

He and Mrs. Sutherland were the only witnesses for the defense in so far as his part in the shooting was concerned.

It appears that the body of the dead man was taken up and the bullet taken from his head, and that on examination it showed the bullet used by Zimmis only used a .32 long.

Zimmis is well known in Graham where he was formerly operator at the tower. He arrived here last night and met many friends who were glad of the verdict in his favor.

It seems that several were involved in the fighting and the friends of Zimmis have never thought he was the guilty party, as he did not seem to be one of those taking an active part in the affray.

THE FESTIVE CUTWORM. It is evident from reports heard from different sections of this county and other counties in the State, that poor and unsatisfactory stands of corn have been secured this season.

due to cool, dry weather partially, and partially to the ravage of insects chiefly cutworms.

These little pests, during the cool, dry weather of the past week or two have played smash with corn. Some fields have had to be furrowed out and planted again.

In nearly every field, large or small, replanting has been necessary. Their ravages are not confined to corn planted on sod, though they seemed to have been more numerous here than on other lands.

On an acre where crimson clover and vetch grew last winter, turned down and planted May 1st, the little worms are thick.

6 per cent of the corn on this plot was damaged or destroyed, and had to be replanted. They seem to have flourished in this sod last winter.

What to do about it is the question. Various schemes, none of them practical, except on a small scale, have been suggested.

It is generally agreed that a rotation of crops, late fall and winter plowing, will rid the land of most of the larvae and eggs out of which the cut worm is produced.
