# WM. WIRT MILLS' NEW YORK LETTER

New York, July 15. Wall Street! Yes, it has been a bad year for the money center of the world but this district looms big in the record of income tax receipts, having paid \$7,000,594 in corporation taxes and \$8,206,597 in individual income tax, while the whole state paid \$10,248,998 corporation taxes out of a total of \$38,817,273 for the whole country, and \$17,379,768 individual income tax out of a total of \$41,011,402 for all the United States. It is a vivid thumbnail sketch of New York City to say that with one-sixteenth of the population of the United States it pays a third of the income tax.

This concentration of wealth in the metropolis persists in spite of the decentralization of the banking power of the country under the Federal Reserve system, for the reason that the nation's trade centers here and cannot be distributed by act of congress.

For example in the fiscal year just ended, the exports from this port reached the huge value of \$1,153,185,764 and the imports were \$920,582,159—a total foreign trade of over two billions.

Of course it was the enormous purchases of war supplies by the allies that ran up the figures so that there was a net gain of \$308,680,975 in exports though there was a loss in every class of merchandise except munitions of war and food supplies.

It is this fact that gives us the contradiction of hard times along with an unprecedented balance of trade in favor of this country, for the temporary prosperity has been hogged by the munition makers and the food speculators. It is this unbalanced condition of trade that explains why the ordinary pursuits of peace are struggling against bankruptcy while the banks are bulging with gold—\$129,000,000 in this city, a gain of \$19,000,000 in a week. It is this oneness of industrial activity that explains the inability of the great U. S. Rubber Company to pay a dividend.

There are all sorts of uses for a safe. But the oddest of all is disclosed by a local banker. He forgot to lock his safe and next day he found it empty. It was robbed by an enemy not by a thief. He advertised the fact fearing this enemy proposed to leave the loot in a room in a hotel of questionable repute and have it distributed there with the purpose of damaging the reputation of the lawyer. For the treasures taken from the unlocked safe were—a nightshirt, a comb and a brush.

Public opinion in this city is kaleidoscopic. There was an outburst of indignation at the sinking of the Armenian, but by nightfall the news that it was a British ship completely reversed the current of criticism, and when it was found that a vessel regularly plying from an American port was "engaged on Admiralty business" the condemnation aimed at Germany in the morning were visited upon Great Britain.

# GOVERNOR STUART AT THE EXPOSITION.

Governor Stuart, in his speech at the San Francisco exposition, won much applause and great commendation from the multitude assembled to do honor to the representatives from the Old Dominion. The text of the speech follows:

"We have crossed the continent, two hundred strong, to bring you the congratulations and good wishes of Old Virginia, her assurances that the ties of friendship and kinship are not weakened by distance, that the impulse of patriotism is not divided or lessened by mountain ranges, great lakes, or broad rivers. In the name of Virginia I thank you for the cordial California welcome that has met us on every hand and for the abounding hospitality with which we have been honored, for the generous and cordial words in which you have expressed the feeling of your own people and of your own heart. We come from the oldest of the States, the State on whose soil the first English-speaking settlement of the great New World was established, from the home of the first germ of our civilization and government to a land where the hopes and dreams of three centuries ago have found fair and glorious fruition.

"When a little company of English-speaking people at Jamestown were yet in the cradle of this great Republic, when three thousand miles of water already traversed lay between them and their native home, their first yearning was for a western ocean and their first cry was for the possession of the unknown land, the far-spreading trackless wilderness that would stretch the boundary from ocean to ocean.

"The charter of 1609 fixed the metes and bounds of Virginia as 200 miles northward from Old Point Comfort, and 200 miles southward from Old Point Comfort, all along the sea coast and up into the land throughout from sea to sea, West and Northwest, and all the islands lying in 100 miles of the sea coast. For more than 150 years Virginia rested on this paper title, and only as the war of the Revolution was closing an expedition composed of Virginians, under command of George Rogers Clarke, was organized and equipped by Patrick Henry, then Governor of Virginia, and sent on the perilous mission of taking possession of the vast territory between the Ohio and the Mississippi Rivers, being all that was then left of the original domain under the terms of a treaty between the Mother Country and Spain. The Mississippi Valley, a very empire in itself, was by this expedition won and saved to the nation, for it was held by Virginia against England, subsequently ceded by Virginia to the Union, and constitutes the territory now occupied by the Middle States. Not content with this limitation of our territory, Thomas Jefferson negotiated the Louisiana purchase, and thus drove the stakes which extended our western border still further toward the Pacific, there to remain for nearly half a century. The Mexican war and its results brought us this beautiful land, and with it the complete fulfillment for the nation of the dream of the little Virginia colony for itself.

"Star of Empire Reaches Limit. "The Star of Empire had at last reached the limit of its westward course in the waters of the Pacific, leaving us the huge possession, out of which State after State has been carved, until forty-eight stars emblazon the national emblem as it floats the insignia of honor and power from sea to sea.

"United as Virginia and California now are by vast systems of trans-continental communication, drawn together by the ties that bind State to State, there is the yet closer tie which springs from Virginia's motherhood of thousands of sons and daughters who have become by your generous adoption loyal Californians. For the filial devotion of these, her children, Virginia returns the fullest measure of maternal love and pride, rejoicing that it has been her privilege to give of her flesh and blood to the upbuilding of your great Commonwealth. In spirit we feel peculiarly near to you, and no expanse of rolling prairie, no height of snowy peak, no far-flung barrier of mountains, can separate you from Virginia, whose people glory in your youthful vigor and your matchless resources.

"Imagination revelled in the prospect of all that we should behold in your land of wonders, but the reality has far exceeded our anticipations. Truly on California has been lavished the treasures of earth and sea and sky. The elusive pot of gold is attached to your rainbow, and in the alchemy of science the philosopher's stone has become not a product of the crucible, but the sparkling water, which pours its healing balm upon the plain, transmuting the arid waste into golden fields of grain or the richer harvest of your orchards and vineyards.

"With reverence we bow in the presence of your mighty trees, oldest of living things, and trace the fleeting centuries they recall.

"With awe we gaze upon the canyons colored through endless ages by sunlight and shadow while the stream cuts its way silently through the rock an image of the triumph of unceasing effort.

"With delight we view the rippling waters of your bay, making a shining pathway for the commerce of the world, and overwhelmed by the majesty of nature as revealed in varied manifestations, we humbly exclaim, "Who is like thee, O, people blessed by the living God."

# A Fitting Celebration.

"The Panama Exposition, magnificent in conception and execution, is a fitting celebration of the greatest engineering accomplishment in all history, marking as has been well said, the greatest liberty man has ever taken with nature. It brings California and Virginia close together by water, makes Hampton Roads and the Golden Gate neighbors. Its opening hastens the day when the Orient will take its stand by the Occident in all that tends to progress and development, when the two will be working together for all that makes the world better and lifts humanity closer to Divinity; when nations that have been sleeping for centuries will be aroused from their lethargy and will become potent factors in an unceasing stream of international traffic on the Pacific Ocean which will make it a highway of trade rivalling in importance that of the Atlantic.

# The Dream of Jefferson.

"The dream of Thomas Jefferson was that this country should become a refuge for the oppressed of all nations, but we cherish the brighter hope that through the spread over the earth of American ideals oppression and war shall cease, and that the fundamental right of mankind to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness shall be universally recognized. On such eternal foundations, broad as humanity, lofty as heaven itself, rests a potential reason for the Panama Canal, the completion of which we make memorable here.

"The Pyramids commemorate the Pharaohs, the Taj Mahal immortalizes an undying love, the Suez Canal brought fame to de Lesseps, the Alpine tunnels are marvels, the Kiel Canal is a monument to German foresight, but the Panama Canal is greater than them all, not alone because it is the supreme triumph of the genius of our race, but because it is the greatest contribution of all time to the means of communication between the nations of the earth. It represents an enormous investment held by the United States primarily for its own purposes, but held also in trust for the benefit of the world, and as such it incarnates a new and vital thought, derived not from precedents and diplomatic notes of premiers, but from the heart of a great people, seeking to bring us closer together, not only in trade and commerce, but in sympathy and common striving for the betterment of mankind.

"In Spanish romance California of old is located near the terrestrial Paradise. Surely the wonderful parks of San Francisco, sloping down to the azure waves, the myriad courts of the exposition buildings filled with treasure from every clime, the jeweled splendor of your towers, the airy grace and dazzling richness of your domes and minarets surpass the fabled loveliness of that land of mystery and fancies of poet, painter and sculptor.

"Such is the splendid vision that greets our eyes in a city which has risen in stately beauty from a fire which less than a decade ago desolated its high places.

"Distance forbids us send to your exposition an elaborate exhibit of Virginia's resources. We have sent you, however, in highly condensed form, a collection of the products of a single Virginia farm, showing possibilities both in variety and value, thus demonstrating versatility of soil and climate unsurpassed by any State in the Union, all from Virginia land, which we venture to assert represents a higher degree of immediate and ultimate productivity and earning power in proportion to purchase money cost than any now left on this continent.

# Brings Virginia's Greetings.

"We bring you from Virginia not only greeting and assurance of good will and material affection, but tribute to your glorious courage and thanks for the service you have done America and the world. Confronted with a calamitous war, involving eleven of the nations of the earth, which deprived you of exhibits and attendance you have every right to expect, you have illustrated the best and highest fortitude of our race; you have turned disaster into victory and furnished an inspiring example of the triumph of exalted courage and indomitable will and energy; you have quered splendidly; you have won admiration and gratitude never to be forgotten.

"May the promised blessing of the hour flow in unceasing volume on your shores and find their high tide in the Golden Gate."

# Tied Down.

(The Philadelphia Public Ledger.) The space and room granted each of us to enact the wise man or play the fool in this little round world of ours is at times appalling. Our thickest, heaviest chains are in reality but as with or twisted straw. We complain that our excessive business ties us down; that we are roped and flung like a Texas steer by a lariat hurling out of the clear blue upon our unweariness, but it is not so. Till we die we can virtually go where we will, do as we choose, despoil or enrich our lives, write our autographs in blessing or in ruin upon the vast human document.

When we were children we bided our time, had the adult say-so imposed on us, were compliant and obedient and obedient willy nilly. Others took care of us, forewarned and guarded for anything. We were thoughtless and selfish, and it was condoned because we were so young. Some kind heart came at our crucial moment and begged us off. It is not that way now. We stand or fall by our own success or failure. We are large enough to take all blame. None can speak for us; none can do our work in the high or in the lowly place of us. Do we like it or not? We are not asked the question, and it makes no difference. We are face to face with life as it really is. The masks and the veils are fallen away. The verities are as serene as Gibraltar, or the North Cape, before our puny slings, our fragile arrows.

We put the blame of our slouching, grudging indifference, our own lack of initiative in the high office of living, on things of fatality and habit. We were born to be thus and so, we say, and hence we are only true to the plan in living as the wind blusth. We cannot help it. This business of finding the next meal and keeping a roof intact for ourselves, and perhaps others, eats us up with the wear and tear of it.

Initiative is paralyzed by the fatigue that rises to its apex when the night comes when no man can work. The temper goes out of us like the spring from steel. Do not ask us to bother about the luxurious, expensive foolishness of art. Art cannot add up a column of figures, or take down a hundred words a minute, or carry a hod, or boil a potato. Art is something finicky and abstract and incurably gentle.

The various excuses take more time than to put our hands to things we are asked to do that outrun the computation of their value in mere figures. Let us not deceive ourselves. Whether we will or will not depends on our volition. We can if we want to. Every waking moment is crammed with decisions. If we get nervous, every choice of what to do or what to say is made with effort. All that was a matter of course in a normal hour becomes arduous and self-conscious. The exaggeration of the condition leads to pitiful vacillations of the quailing spirit and the fainting flesh in a moral vertigo. Yet over all kinds of weakness the dominant will demands to be heard and insists that it is not conquerable. Who shall dare to say to any man that his will is broken beyond repair, that he has gone wrong for so great a period that it is no use to try for a retrieval? That is for a man's own self to decide, and none can send forth orders from his mind to his body for him. But let him be cured, once for all, of the delusion that circumstances are too much for him; that heredity and environment have insurmountably handicapped his career, that anything outside of his own life has clipped and hobbled his aspirations. The bonds and fetters are of his own contrivance.
