DOES STUART FAVOR GLASS?

The announcement of Richard E. Byrd that he will not be a candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination practically makes it certain that the list of candidates who will come before the primary will be made up of J. Taylor Elyson, John Garland Pollard and Westmoreland Davis. We have authoritative information that Carter Glass, of more than two or three weeks ago, visited Richmond at the request of Governor Stuart, to discuss with him the possibilities of his (Glass) becoming a candidate. In the event that he should decide to shy his castor into the ring, Pollard would likely withdraw, after having acted as vacancy holder for Glass. Mr. Glass has decided that a seat in the House in hand is worth two seats in the Senate in the bush.—Harrisonburg News-Record.

COMING: MORE JOBS THAN MEN.

The outgoing emigration under normal industrial conditions is from 200,000 to 300,000 a year. It may rise to double that number if industrial conditions improve in Europe. Then America may be confronted with a labor vacuum; then we may find it difficult in building railroads, in manning our mills and factories, in harvesting the crops. The war may, and in my opinion will, react upon America in this way. Continued expanding prosperity in this country, the great falling off in immigration during the past two years, and the exodus of foreign-born after the war may create a situation in which American industry will be confronted with a condition it has never faced before. There may be more jobs than men. Unemployment may come to an end in America as in Europe. And the quickness with which organized labor has sensed its power during the last few months suggests that under such circumstances the condition of labor would rapidly improve. Wages will rise, and they may rise far above the present level.—Frederick C. Howe, in American Review of Reviews for November.

IN THE BALKANS.

There is some clearing of the skies for the allies in the Balkans. The clouds that have obscured and threatened to engulf their hopes lift, momentarily at least.

The gallant Serbians, fighting with desperate valor are holding the Bulgarians before Monastir, and the pressure exerted on Greece promises to result in at least partial fulfillment of Greek obligations. French and British troops are being landed daily at Saloniki. There are persistent reports that Italy has disembarked an army on the coast of the Adriatic, and will march across Albania to Serbia's relief. There are other reports emanating from Berlin, that Russia is mobilizing in Bessarabia, and that Roumania is likely to afford free passage to the Russian cohorts. Gorizia trembles before the onslaught of Italian artillery, and its fall, daily expected, will be certain to relieve Austrian pressure on Serbia and Montenegro. The allies have a chance to breathe, at any rate.—Ex.
