FRENCH NEW YEAR CARDS.

Five Words of Correspondence Allowed on Them, but No More.

Frenchwomen and Frenchmen discharge their New Year obligations simply. A visiting card is put in an envelope of its size, which is left unsealed, and for a one cent stamp the post carries each card to its destination. One may even write on the card five words of mere compliment, such as "Best wishes for New Year!"

But if you write more or if your five words are real correspondence, such as "New Year's dinner at 8," and if the post clerk looks at it he may notify you to pass at the office and pay \$2 fine for infraction of postal laws. But if you put the regular letter stamp of 2 cents on your card envelope you may write all you will.

The circulation of these cards runs up in Paris alone into the millions. Extra squads of post clerks are put on for a month to handle them, for one may begin card calls before Christmas and continue not only to Twelfth Night, but to Candlemas day, in February.

Open baskets are put out along the counters of all the branch postoffices to receive these little envelopes.

Rush For Locomotives.

The call for locomotives the present year is very large. American roads for the first ten months of this year ordered 940, and the rate of orders is increasing, indicating that the domestic call will exceed 1,000. The foreign orders for ten months are 1,581. Word has gone out to the railroads that if they will need new equipment they had best reserve space now, as the prospect in the shops will be fully occupied later. Orders have been taken from Cuba, Spain, and Greece, and it is expected that other neutral countries that have bought of Germany will send orders to this country.—Lewiston Journal.

V. M. L. INDISCRETIONS.

Nobody expects the cadets at the Virginia Military Institute to be a collection of spotless and meek little white lambs. Most of them are husky, virile boys, with full allowances of boy human nature and inborn and outcropping devilment. We would dislike very much to see them changed into a lot of nice, precise, finicky mollycoddles. Yet, according to reports, they are doing now and are threatening some things not creditable to their manhood or in accord with the best traditions of this state or of the Institute. We are told of a visit by six of them, going at night, to the room of a Washington and Lee student whom they suspected of being responsible for sending out the reports of the hazing of the dead cadet, Thurber Sweet. Other stories are that Paul Scott, the Washington and Lee man who sent the story of the alleged hazing to the newspapers has been warned to leave Lexington forthwith, presumably on pain of serious bodily injury. There is talk, too, of extreme hostile "tension" between the two schools. If some one cadet about equal in weight and age, had challenged Scott or the other suspected student to fair fight there would be some force in the act, at least a demonstration of the man's readiness to uphold the honor of his corps at the risk of his own skin and features. But when it comes to a number of men undertaking or threatening to combine against a real or supposed offender, it is the essence of lynch law defiance of school rules, of the law of the land and of all the standards of the code of honor by which every gentleman is supposed to try to live.

It is safe to say that love does not flow without some service. Bryan's service is real and obvious. He kept the torch of faith in better things alight in one of the most sordid periods of American life. He stood steadfastly by those things typified by Mark Hanna—that cynical betrayal of the nation's interests by the majority of the nation's representatives against which the people arose in 1910. Bryan breathed realism in an hour of brutal materialism; he preached popular control under a government directed by financial lobbies.


