He argued that the question presented by the bill was not a race question, but one of duty. In several States the rights of the individual citizen had been outraged, and the equality of the States in the matter of representation had been envied and denied. No more important subject commanded the attention of the American people than the one under discussion. If Congress obeyed their duty in this matter it would mean peace throughout the country; if it refused, it would but involve the country in the perils of retributive justice, which was ever the ally of the oppressed.
