THE OLD NORTH STATE.

COMING DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY.

The Third Party Leaders in a Habid State Butler Denounces and Exum Threatens to Murder an Editor on Sight.

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 29.—Special.—Estimates were made to-day upon the result in this State in the coming election. It is predicted that Cleveland will carry the State by at least ten thousand majority, and that the State ticket will run possibly a few thousand ahead of this. It is conceded that the Republicans may elect as many as two Congressmen, but the other seven will be Democratic. The point most in doubt is the Legislature. There are apprehensions that the Republicans and Third parties may elect a majority in the House, but the Democratic leader contends that the Senate, if the Democrats control the Senate, State legislation will still be safe. Dr. Exum and other Third party leaders have been in consultation with Republicans here to-day and important developments are expected.

NEW YORK COTTON MARKET.

New York, Oct. 29.—Receipts at the ports for the day are estimated at 30,000 bales, against 24,000 bales last week and 65,000 bales last year. We compare this week with a port movement of 345,000 bales, a total movement of 362,000 bales, and a total movement of 401,000 bales for the corresponding week last year. The cotton that came into sight the past week, which, owing to the holiday, includes eight days, was 400,000 bales, against 452,000 bales last year, and the total movement since September 1st is 1,815,000 bales, against 2,771,000 bales a year ago. EXUM FAITS TO APPEAR.

Roxboro, N. C., Oct. 29.—Special.—Exum, Populist candidate for Governor, was announced to speak here Thursday, but failed to arrive. Elector Newborne filled his appointment, speaking in the evening. The Populist Department will not consent to this change in the original contract for carrying the fast mail unless a reduction be made in the amount paid by the Government corresponding with the distance saved, which is said to be about seventy miles. Unless these matters are adjusted immediately, it is probable that it will be some months before the through route is made, possibly even longer.

Dr. J. A. Pringle Withdraws.

Winston, N. C., Oct. 29.—Special.—Stokes Democrats are rejoicing over the withdrawal to-day of Dr. J. A. Pringle, Third party candidate for the Legislature. He came down at the request of thirty-five of the most influential Populists in the county. The whole Third party ticket has withdrawn in this county.
