A NUMBER OF IMPORTANT DECIS. IONS HANDED DOWN.

Among the Cases Decided Were One From Danville-From Gloverster County-One From Henrico_Oibe: Businers.

The following opinions were handed down in the Supreme Court of Appeals yesterday:

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
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
