

HE TOOK LAUDANUM.

THIS DRUG CAUSES THE DEATH OF W. G. WRIGHT, OF MANCHESTER.

WRIGHT, of 101 Semmes street, who has been a resident of Manchester for the past year, having come to this city from Michigan, was found in an unconscious condition under a tree near Bell Lane Junction, a short while after noon yesterday.
