THINGS THAT SURPRISE VISITORS TO THE EXPOSITION AT ATLANTA.

Some Southern Beauties—Thirteen Attractive Maidens From Many States Headed by the Daughter of the Confederacy.

ATLANTA, Oct. 6.—The Minnesota editors, two hundred in number, had narrowly retired from the field before Tennessee took possession of the Exposition, which it did on Saturday. A most interesting programme had been prepared, including a banquet; all the details for which were brought by special train from Knoxville. A large representation came from Nashville, Memphis, Knoxville and Chattanooga. The Tennessee women celebrated the day during the Revolution, upon which the "clans" marched to King's mountain. Mrs. J. Harvey Mathis, State Regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution, presided.

Almost every woman of prominence in every field of woman's work will be heard in the charming little auditorium of the Women's Congress. Mr. George Hanes, a young man of this city, will leave here to-morrow for Brazil. He will engage in the coffee business.


The Alligator Was Lively.
