Lancaster, Jr., for \$5,000 upon the engines, boilers, and other apparatus of the plant of the firm on Cary street; the other deed is given to Mann S. Quarles, trustee, covering the same property.

Mrs. Ellis M. Talbott is placed in the third class for \$10,339.40, with interest. In the fourth class is Mrs. E. T. Munford for \$5,300, while the fifth class contains all other creditors.

Palmer, for themselves and other bondholders of the concern, asking for the appointment of a receiver. Judge Minor promptly granted the petition, and appointed Robert A. Lancaster receiver, who at once gave bond for the sum of \$20,000.
