Rough Treatment.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15-The cabinet meeting to-day was devoted to matters pertaining to the forthcoming departmental reports.

The case of Captain Levering, charged with the cruel treatment of private soldiers at Fort Sheridan, near Chicago, was left in the hands of Secretary Arthur, who will undoubtedly order a court-martial to investigate the case.

It is said Captain Levering had the soldier dragged by his feet from the guard-house across the parade ground to the officers' quarters because the soldier would not walk, claiming he was physically unable to do so.

Suffered Terribly.

KANSAS CITY, MO., Oct. 15-Alexander C. Hart died a horrible death last night. He fell from a tree in a remote part of the city Tuesday morning. He suffered concussion of the spine, and was almost completely paralyzed.

Unable to stir, he lay there conscious for over two days and nights until found Thursday afternoon. He was eaten by insects and his sufferings were intense. Physicians were summoned, but Hart died shortly after relief reached him.

TO JAIL FOR CONTEMPT.

JUDGE TAKEN SUMMARY MEASURES WITH ELECTION BOARD.

Big Sued Instituted in Norfolk-A Negro Killed-Lumber Destroyed by Fire.

Republican Endorsed.

NORFOLK, VA., Oct. 15-Special.-Judge Prentiss has issued an order for the committal to jail of Finley Cromwell and R. S. Shea members of the Norfolk county electoral board, who were adjudged in contempt for failure to agree on a third member. The order directs the sheriff to take them into jail and custody Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock and keep them confined until they do the court's bidding or until the further order of the court.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

Yesterday a party of gentlemen left Deepwater in Southampton county for a deer hunt, taking Richard Stevens (colored) along with them.
