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explained many things about the Nation. An explanation was also given of the steel torpedo netting thrown out from and around vessels to protect them from the torpedoes, the improved rapid-fire guns carried by all modern men-of-war, and the so-called "disappearing" gun now being mounted in our harbors and along our coast.

OURS IS THE BEST ARMOR. Next he described the different kinds of armor plate used by the various governments, paying a high compliment to the nickel-steel armor plate which has been used in the construction of our modern war vessels.

AMERICAN COURAGE. Captain Campbell told of an interesting incident illustrating the courage, determination and kindness of a well-known American naval captain. It was some time ago that the British merchant ship "Boya" was lying in the harbor of Smyrna waiting for her clearance papers to sail for New York.

ing men and destroying commerce and other property would be little short of extermination and then the necessity for settling their national differences and arguments by arbitration would be clear to see.

NO SMALL MATTER.

"I do not say that there will be war between the United States and Spain," said Captain Campbell. "Certainly there is reason for this country to force Spain to make reparation for the Maine outrage alone. If there is war, I think it will be a very serious one and while I believe the United States will be victorious in the long run, Spain will give us a great deal of trouble even if she gets her hands off of the islands from some European power which is not by any means certain before the conflict is closed. The Spanish navy will worry that of the United States a great deal, and can do an immense amount of harm to our commerce, and it is up to our agents to do this. There is no reason why our agents could not ask some of our coast cities, especially to shell them, and demand some payment for sparing the heaviest cities from complete destruction by bombardment. This thing will be done in more than one case. With this money they can help carry on the conflict."
