constitute a union of the Federation of Labor. —Unionists exclusively will erect the Pan-American Exposition Building at Buffalo. —The treasurer of the English Miners' Federation was recently elected Mayor of Burslem. —At Auburn, N. Y., the building trades are going to make a fight for the 8-hour day on April 1st. —New York policemen want the 8-hour day, and the Legislature has been asked to legalize the demand. —Union stair builders in Brooklyn obtained a Saturday half holiday without reduction in their wages. —The Frisco District Council of Carpenters and Joiners has decided to increase the initiation fee to \$10 on February 1st. —The municipal council of Brussels, Belgium, voted \$1,000 to pay the expenses of workmen delegates to the Paris Exhibition. —A New York Carpenters Union, 513, has voted down a motion to demand \$1 a day and eight hours in all shops (inside work). —Brooklyn bricklayers earn 53 cents an hour; eight hours constitute a day's work. They also work only till noon on Saturday. —The British unionist is now interest-

ed chiefly in the compulsory 8-hour law, the workmen's compensation and the old pension act, and the housing of workmen. —The bread-eating world reaped more than 2,300,000,000 bushels of wheat every 12 months to supply its table with bread. —The Lake Seaman's Union has decided that members who served in the Spanish-American war are exempt from payment of dues for the period of their service in the navy. —Pinstripers' Union, No. 1, of Brooklyn, will shortly enter on the thirty-seventh year of its existence. It has a membership of about 1000 and reserve funds exceeding \$900. —In Germany the number of sitting and standing places in the street cars is plainly marked. If a car is designed to carry 30 persons no more than 20 persons are permitted to ride on that car at the same time. —The General Federation of Trade Unions now embraces 49 trade unions with an aggregate membership of 767,877, which is an increase since July of five unions and nearly three thousand members. —The American Federation of Labor is now composed of 73 national and international unions, 35 local trade unions and 202 Federal labor unions, 11 State

federations of labor, and 118 city central labor unions and trades assemblies. —The American Federation has completed the eighth volume of its issues.
