

FRESH GOSSIP FROM GOTHAM. Twenty Thousand Dollars for a Wife's Affections. Broughton Losing Adherents.

The Count and Countess de Castellane are Having a Great Time—Mr. Cleveland's Successful Hunt. Motor Car Burns on the Track.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Special.—For the loss of a wife's affections a jury in the Supreme Court to-day awarded Frederick C. Hinkle \$20,000 damages.

During the afternoon the Countess received a party of old time friends in the hotel apartments, no fewer than fifty cards having been sent up. Among the first callers of the day were Mrs. William Astor and Mrs. Edwidge T. Gerry. Following these leaders of society were many others who came to greet the Countess.

Last evening Mr. and Mrs. George Gould entertained Count and Countess de Castellane at dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria, and later at a theatre party, where they were joined by Miss Helen Gould.
