

FAKIRS ARE USING CARNIVAL'S NAME

Association Learns of Bogus Advertising Solicitors.

THE PUBLIC IS WARNED.

Plans for a Grand Military Display Arranged, and Inducements Offered to Secure Troops From Two States—Work Going On.

The officers of the Richmond Carnival Association has learned that the name of the association is being fraudulently used to solicit advertising for the Carnival. The association desires the public to know that no person who has not an order signed by the President, Mr. Alex H. Meyer, is authorized to solicit such advertisement, and it is urged that no attention be paid to such persons.

The Advertising Committee met this morning and out of the contract for two banners to be hung in the street. They will have a picture of King Carnival and lettering similar to the banner now on Main Street. One of these will be hung at the Byrd-Street depot and the other probably at Elba station.

MILITARY PARADE. Some time since a committee consisting of General A. Phillips, General C. J. Anderson, Colonels John B. Purcell and Percy Hawes, Major A. S. Lanier and Captain J. W. Lockwood, Jr., was appointed by the Carnival Association to conduct a competitive drill during the Fair. It has been found inexpedient to have a competitive drill, so the committee was directed to make arrangements for a large military parade during the Fair.

Arrangements are also being made to provide quarters for visiting troops. In addition to the quarters already provided, a very large number of tents are being put up at a moderate price. The indications are that the proposed military parade will be an interesting feature of the Fair.

The Manufacturers' Exhibit Committee met last night. Plans for the inviting and accommodation of the various manufacturers were considered and their convenience arranged for.

Plans were submitted at Carnival Headquarters yesterday by Messrs. Albert F. Hunt and Louis Marc for a Court of Honor to be erected on Union Street, one block east from First. The cost of this court would be about \$2,000.

The Richmond Passenger and Power Company has filed with the City Engineer plans for the rehabilitation of the Richmond Railway and Electric Company's property. These plans propose some radical changes in the arrangement of the various tracks.
