

UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN PARTIES North Carolina Populists and Republicans to Work Together. JOINT DEBATE REFUSED. Chairman Simmons of the Democratic Party Calls the Turn on Butler.

RALEIGH, N. C., April 23.—Special.—In reply to Chairman Butler's proposition to Chairman Simmons to divide time with the Populist nominees for Senate says: "The Populist Convention said the constitutional amendment would not be made a party question, but must be decided by the judgment and conscience of each voter. You ask for joint debate upon the amendment, thus disclosing your purpose to commit your party to a position which it refused to take in the convention. This shows a misunderstanding with the Populist party."

It is known that there is perfect understanding between the two parties, and the nomination of a State ticket and the division of the vote is to direct and divide attention of white voters, while the Republicans fasten negro rule on the State. Under those circumstances it is impossible for the Democrats to have any opposition of the Populists. Besides this the Democrats have no nominees for the Senate as yet, nor will not have until the amendment is settled.

The Mokane Land and Improvement Company, capital stock \$100,000; the Orchard Manufacturing Company for furniture, and the Specks Manufacturing Company, to manufacture barrels, crates, etc., at Beaufort, were all incorporated Saturday.

Work has begun in earnest on the new electric plant on Nouse River, five miles from here. It is said the plant will be ready for furnishing power and lights to each voter by the end of the year, if not sooner.

In a yard in the center of the city here, there is a Japan walnut tree in full bloom. These blooms are ten or twelve inches long and are very beautiful. A Persian walnut tree in the same yard, but it has never bloomed.

NEW BOATS If Ordered, Some Will Be Built at the Trigg Yards. Washington Bureau, The Times, April 23.—Special.—The House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries have reported favorably the bill authorizing the establishment of a station for the investigation of problems connected with marine fishery interests of the Middle and South Atlantic Coast. The House Committee on Naval Affairs to-day gave a hearing on the proposition authorizing the Navy Department to contract for twenty torpedo boats of the Holland type. Admirals Tracy and Dewey are present. Admiral Dewey advocated their purchase. Ex-Congressman Trigg was also present, and afterward gave out that if the torpedo boats were ordered part of them would be built at the Trigg yards, at Richmond.

Secretary Gage to-day submitted a communication to Congress advocating the establishment of a Standardizing and Testing Bureau to accurately test and adjust all instruments of precision used in physics. The communication contained an endorsement from Professor Francis H. Smith, of the University of Virginia. Representative Gage, of West Virginia, to-day introduced the following war relief claim bills: Authorizing the payment of \$250 to J. B. Fitzgerald, of North Carolina, for stores and supplies furnished by Union Army during the civil war; authorizing the payment of \$10,000 to George W. Fisher, of North Carolina, for property appropriated by Federal troops during the civil war.

ENTHUSIASTIC CONFEDERATE Will Paint the Stars and Bars on His Roof. FREDERICKSBURG, VA., April 23.—Special.—An enthusiastic ex-Confederate in Mason county, Va., painted a Confederate flag on the roof of his residence. The first excursion of the season to this city will be given by the Ladies' Aid Society of Calvary Baptist Church, Richmond county, up the Hoppanoach, by a Weems Line steamer, May 24. Many distinguished people will attend the encampment of the Army of the Potomac in this city May 25th and 26th. George Fitz Lee, in acknowledging an invitation, writes that he is anxious to be present, but cannot determine until later whether his official duties will admit of his absence from Cuba at that time.

LYNCHBURG'S MONUMENT Corner Stone Laid With Impressive Masonic Ceremonies. LYNCHBURG, VA., April 23.—Special.—The corner stone of the monument to be erected to the memory of Lynchburg's Confederate dead was laid this afternoon with a Masonic ceremony conducted by Grand Master Colonel R. Craighill, Past Grand Master of the State. Addresses were made by Captain Charles M. Blackford, Congressman Peter J. Otey, and Dr. Rawley W. Martin, and prayers were offered by Dr. T. M. Carson and Dr. W. J. Young. The exercises began at 5 o'clock and were of a most impressive character and were participated in by the Masons, ex-Confederates, members of the Kirkwood, City and Old Dominion chapters, United Daughters of the Confederacy, the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the members of the Memorial Association. Hon. Tipton D. Jennings was chief marshal for the occasion.

MURDER IN-MECKLENBURG Killing of an Old Man of Peculiar Characteristics. BOYDTON, VA., April 23.—Special.—Commonwealth's Attorney Goode received telegram yesterday from the Buffalo Lithia Springs neighborhood, stating that old Mr. Peter Jones had been foully murdered on Sunday, but that the time the murder was committed and the perpetrators of the crime were unknown.

Mr. Jones was an old man, being about eighty years old, and in many respects was a remarkable man. He seemed to have had a mania for keeping a record of all passing events, such as deaths and the record of any scandal or unusual events occurring in the neighborhood. Commonwealth's Attorney Goode is going over to the scene of the tragedy this afternoon, and will make every effort to bring the guilty parties to justice. The newly appointed board for allowing pensions to disabled soldiers of the county will meet here on the 30th.

Attempted Suicide. WILLIAMSBURG, VA., April 23.—Special.—Robert J. Williams, residing at the Eastern State Hospital, attempted to commit suicide early yesterday morning, by drinking a large quantity of laudanum. The act was discovered immediately, and the drug had been taken, and only the heroic efforts of the hospital physicians saved him.
