Interesting Meeting at Lee Camp Hall Last Night.

AGAINST CERTAIN HISTORIES

Refuse to Accept Dr. McGuire's Resignation—Judge George L. Christian Made Chairman Pro Tem.

There was an informal meeting of a portion of the members of the History Committee of the Grand Camp of Confederate Veterans and Sons of Veterans of Virginia at Lee Camp Hall at 6:30 o'clock yesterday evening.

Action was taken on several matters of importance, but it was understood to be not binding on the committee, as there was not a quorum of the members present.

On motion of Dr. Tucker, Judge George L. Christian was called to the chair and Captain Thomas Elliott was made secretary.

DR. MCGUIRE RESIGNS. Captain Elliott, in a letter from Dr. Stuart McGuire, tendering the resignation of his father as chairman of the History Committee on account of ill-health.

DR. TUCKER THOUGHT THE RESIGNATION should not be accepted, and that Dr. McGuire should remain at the head of the committee, even though he might not be able to attend actively to the duties of chairman.

JUDGE CHRISTIAN TO ACCEPT. Captain Hazlewood suggested that the Grand Commander, General Smith, being of Petersburg, who was present, appoint a temporary chairman to act during Dr. McGuire's illness.

DR. JOSEPH W. SOUTHWELL, Superintendent of Public Instruction, was present and was asked by Chairman Christian what was the prospect of getting Pliske's History of the State.

DR. SOUTHWELL THEN EXPLAINED how these books had gotten on the list, and said in the great rush of business incident to the school books, the board had understood that the country was desired by the History Committee.
