

A SORRY CROWD IN POLICE COURT

Atkins Jeffress Has More Than One Sin to His Credit.

TOILS OF LAW TIGHTEN ON HIM.

The Mecklenburg Negroes Give Lots of Trouble, but Always Produce the Money to Pay a Fine—An Amateur Detective.

The slums had been raked over for the grand parade in the Big White Chamber yesterday, and there will be little crime in town as long as they are in limbo.

A sorry crowd marched in review before 'Squire Lonnie Graves in the Police Court yesterday, and when the day's work was over the pen was as full as the brig of a man-of-war after a day ashore by the crew.

GANG OF BUZZARDS. Julia Holmes (colored) was charged with assaulting and trying to cut Janet Turner, a man with money and a satchel had strayed into the roost of these black vultures.

John Williams, alias Norfolk, was charged with cutting Ben Johnson, a colored lawyer defended Williams, and colored him with certain high impulses, that were, no doubt, a surprise to Williams himself.

Lena Barnes—slim, black and sleek—swept up before the court, charged with attempting to cut Emma Simons with a razor.

It was a bad day for Richmond when the "Good colored" Samaritans transplanted the Barnes family from Lunenburg to this city. They are the terror of the neighborhood and ever since they were charged with murdering "Old Mrs. Pollard."

Lena was fined \$10 and her father shuffled up in his old dirty-blue army uniform and promptly paid the fine with costs.

Allice Jasper, Rowen Williams and Sydney Jasper were charged with assaulting and abusing Mary Johnson. This was another case of "much nigger-talk and fines all around."

AMATEUR DETECTIVE. Guy A. Newkirk was under arrest as a suspicious character. Mr. Newkirk is from the country. Any town negro could tell him a square deal, but Mr. Newkirk had in his pocket a card appointing him a member of the American Detective Association, for which he paid two dollars, having answered an advertisement to that effect.

The card announced that Mr. Newkirk was member No. 815 of the American Detective Association, and called on the police to extend to him all the courtesies of the position.

Armed with this card, Mr. Newkirk came to town from an adjoining county to look for a criminal. He might need a street.

Having searched the bar-rooms with diligence, he went to the office of the Chief of Police, to borrow a pair of handcuffs, in order to secure his man should he meet him.

A charge of being a suspicious character was preferred against him and he was in the Police Court this morning, looking as much like a detective as a policeman does a ballet-girl.

He was discharged, a wiser and a soberer man.

A BAD NEGRO. Atkins Jeffress, the negro giant who was before the court the day before, having been arrested by Officer Wyatt for swindling Ann Lacy, an old colored woman, out of her hard-earned wages to play it at policy, was back again, charged with stealing a gun.

Jeffress is over six feet high, very athletic and carries a considerable scar on his forehead. He seems to have made himself very pleasant to the colored females with whom he came in contact, and by this means worked his schemes.

He borrowed a breech-loading gun from Matilda Smith's son last October and never returned it.
