

HULL-STREET CAR WRECKED Demolished in a Collision with a Freight Train. RESISTED THE OFFICER Southern Railway Fire Company Preparing to Attend the Convention, Asbury Church Purchased by the School Board.

Manchester Bureau, Richmond Times. Car No. 22, of the Hull-Street line of the Richmond Passenger and Power Company, was completely wrecked last night about 10 o'clock at the crossing of the Coast Line Railroad by a freight train, which was shifting on the tracks. The car was in charge of Motorman James Ryan and Conductor William Brackett. Ryan was slightly hurt about the chest, while Brackett escaped without injury. There were no passengers on at the time. The car is said to have been hung up on tracks, when the train of cars being backed struck it about the centre, entirely demolishing the rear end and throwing the car about 50 feet from the tracks.

Car No. 22 had only been out of the shops one week, after being repaired from damage received three weeks ago. ASSAULTED THE OFFICER. Jim Charters, while under arrest last night, assaulted Captain Smith, the officer who had him in charge, and escaped. Charters was arrested for creating a disturbance at the fire convention at Upper Hull Street, and came without resistance with the officer until he reached Ninth and Hull Streets. Here his brother, who had been following down the street, overtook them, and a rough and tumble fight ensued. Captain Smith was struck several times in the face, but not before he had used his club with telling effect on his assailant, did the struggle end. Both escaped out Ninth Street, and at a late hour last night had not been arrested.

The Southern Railway Fire Department, of the shops in this city, received yesterday their new reel, which was ordered a few days ago at the cost of \$500. The reel is a beauty, nickel-plated and ball-bearing, and will be one of the best of its kind. The firemen's parade, to take place in Richmond next week. The School Trustees, of the Manchester district, purchased yesterday the old Asbury Church property, on the corner of Eleventh and Everett Streets, which in the future will be occupied as the school building, replacing the small quarters which have been used by the school in the past. At a recent meeting of the trustees all the old teachers were re-elected with one exception. The vacancy will be filled at a meeting to be held tomorrow.

The county schools will open on the first Monday in October. NEW REQUIREMENTS. The contract had been signed between the Richmond Passenger and Power Company and J. H. H. Bradley, on the laying of the new rails on Seventh and Hull Streets, but on account of the passage of a recent ordinance by the City Council requiring crushed stone to be used in the road-beds, the contract will necessarily be changed, and as Mr. Bradley states yesterday morning the work will be delayed for a few days. However, it will be begun at an early date.
