

REVENUES LARGER THAN EVER BEFORE

Report of Treasurer of United States Submitted to Mr. Gaze. SHOWS VERY LARGE SURPLUS.

There was a Large Net Decrease in Expenditures, Thus Turning the Deficit of Year Before Into a Surplus of \$79,527,000.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The annual report of the Treasurer of the United States, Ellis H. Roberts, on the operations and condition of the Treasury, was submitted to Secretary Gaze to-day. Mr. Roberts says the growth and prosperity of the country and the general activity are reflected in the transactions of the office. The net ordinary revenues of the Government for the fiscal year were \$272,200,000, the largest in the history of the country, exceeding those of 1899, the next highest by \$17,288,000.

The increase of \$21,250,000 over the preceding year was contributed to from all the general sources, but chiefly from customs and internal revenues. On the side of the expenditures there was a net decrease of \$11,000,000 in comparison with 1899, so that the deficiency of \$30,111,500 for that year was converted into a surplus of \$79,527,000 in 1900.

NOTES REDEEMED. Promptly on the enactment of the new financial law the Department of Issue and Redemption, therein provided for, were established, and to them were transferred the records and accounts relating to the issue and redemption of United States notes, gold certificates, silver certificates and currency certificates. Up to October 1, 1900, \$22,500,000 in United States notes and \$3,200,000 in Treasury notes were redeemed out of the reserve fund of \$50,000,000. Each day the notes so redeemed were exchanged for gold from the general fund, so that the reserve was kept intact in amount and character. Besides the reserve fund the trust funds, consisting of gold coin, silver dollars and bullion, and United States notes held for the redemption of silver and treasury notes amounted on the date to \$1,000,000,000, and increased by a law of January 1, 1900, to \$749,955,578.

Money in Circulation. The aggregate amount of money of all kinds in circulation on October 1, 1900, is estimated at \$2,113,244,963, an increase of \$10,810,744 in fifteen months, of which \$4,400,000 was due to the enlarged use of gold and silver certificates. The increase per capita was from \$5.58 to \$7.01. The per capita of gold at the latter date was \$10.29, which is greater than that of all other currencies in 1892, while the total of gold is greater than all the circulation at any time previous to July, 1878. On October 1st, 24.21 per cent. of the total circulation was in gold and gold certificates, 25.45 in silver dollars, silver certificates and treasury notes, 15.25 per cent. in United States notes and \$1.11 per cent. in national bank notes.

STOCKS ON THE GROWING.

It is a significant comparison that on June 30, 1890, the percentage of United States notes was 22.58. Two years earlier it was as high as 22.67. While the volume of United States notes, treasury notes and silver certificates is limited by statutory provisions, the stock of gold is continually growing. The metallic stock of money is estimated for October 1st, 1900, as \$1,000,000,000 in gold; \$300,000,000 in silver dollars and bullion, and \$5,000,000 in fractional silver coin, an increase of \$1,000,000,000 since March 14th strengthened the guarantee for the maintenance of the gold standard, both in providing for the setting apart of a reserve fund and in adding one-half to the \$100,000,000, which in the practice of the Department was formerly maintained without specific statutory requirement. The fixed volume of United States notes was raised from 28.5 to 42.7 per cent. While the ratio of the new reserve to the sum of both classes of legal tender notes was originally only 14 per cent., the gradual increase of the \$100,000,000 of treasury notes, outstanding at the passage of the act, will reduce the demands on the fund to that extent.

PRINCE AND OLVER.

The Assault of Little Miss Donat Was Indicted. (Special Dispatch to The Times.) NORFOLK, VA., Nov. 12.—The full term of the United States Court for the Eastern District of Virginia, which began here last night, was adjourned to to-day. The grand jury has completed its work, among the indictments returned being one against Police Captain M. H. Prince, for murder of Prince Olver, and killed Charles Cannon, a prominent local politician, on August 6th. The killing took place on the custom-house reservation, within the shadow of the building which houses the United States Court-house. The fatal shot was fired from a rifle which has been for a long time on account of the prominence of both Prince and Cannon, who up to the time of the shooting were supposed to be fast friends. A sensational feature of the affair is the positive refusal of Prince and his friends to assign any cause for the killing, other than that it was justifiable.
