Mr. Carnegie, in the philanthropic distribution of a large part of the gigantic fortune which he has succeeded in accumulating, has set an example for the millionaires of America and the world, the ultimate results of which it is impossible to forecast. His dictum that "the man who dies rich dies disgraced," is destined to everlasting remembrance, so far as the generation of to-day can see into the future. It is a superb acknowledgement of what the society—that is, the people—has done for the very rich classes. All humanity will be benefited by Mr. Carnegie's stupendous generosity.

It must be said in justice to the rich men of America, that there are no more splendid examples in the world. During the last hundred years more money has been contributed for philanthropic work in the United States than in all the countries of Europe combined. Great seats of learning have been founded and richly endowed; magnificent hospitals have been established; splendid houses of worship have been built and charitable institutions of every description erected and put on an enduring basis. Thousands of millions of dollars have been expended in this way, and the good that has been accomplished through all these agencies can never be known on earth.

MONARCHY AND SELFISHNESS.
All this munificent generosity is one of the results of the republican system of government. Under monarchical rule those who accumulate great fortunes in commercial enterprises use it, as a rule, for selfish purposes. By them it is made the basis of raising themselves in the social scale. They buy great estates, which is the first step toward obtaining for themselves or their children, a place among a so-called aristocracy, and thereby, as they imagine, perpetuating their names. Among them the governing rule of action is to keep and not to give. Under our forms this is impossible. There are no legal provisions for the preservation of families; no hereditary honors that can be bought, and the laws of entail were swept from the statute books when the royal authority was overthrown by the founders of the republic. Had we retained our connection with the mother country we should, beyond all question, have the richest artificial nobility in the world on this side of the Atlantic, for inevitably the creators of the great American fortunes would have been invested with so-called honors and titles.

SIX NOBLE WORDS.
To be convinced of this fact, all we have to do is to look at the dominion to the north of us. There we see the process in full operation. I am not certain whether they yet have a lord up that way or not; but there is a fair assortment of full-fledged knights, who are entitled to be addressed as Sir John This or Sir Thomas That. The only nobility among us is the nobility, not of caste and prerogative, but of the purest and loftiest philanthropy.
