OTHER SLIGHT DAMAGE. The stable of Mr. Randolph Williams, in the rear of his residence, on Grace Street, caught fire also, but the damage amounted to nothing, as it was quickly put out.

Five awnings were burned at the store of the Briggs Drug Co., corner First and Broad Streets. The damage is probably \$25.

The awning of Messrs. S. & G. H. Moore, wall-paper dealers, No. 23 North First Street, was burned down. Estimated value \$15.

Mr. James Kain, who keeps a wine and liquor store at No. 15 East Broad Street, went to a lot of trouble for nothing.

His only loss was from stealing, which amounted to but little. Mr. Kain carried no insurance, and thought at one time he might lose his stock if it was not removed.

ACCIDENTS AT THE FIRE.

Several Persons Were Injured But None of Them Seriously. There were a few persons injured at the fire, but none of these were seriously hurt.

Fireman Piller, of Truck Company No. 1, fell from a ladder and sprained his ankle. He was treated by Dr. Fisher.

About 9:30 o'clock a spark started a blaze on the residence of Mrs. Laura Cullen, No. 20 East Franklin Street.

Arthur Koiker, the fourteen-year-old son of Commissioner of Agriculture, Koiker, was run over by a coal wagon on Broad Street, near First, while witnessing the fire.

Miss Estelle Shepperson, the transfer clerk on the first floor, had an exciting experience in escaping from the fire and was almost prostrated as a result.

She was very nearly the last woman to get out of the building. A young lady, one of the clerks, had a very narrow escape.

The two men picked her up and with difficulty carried her through the heat and smoke down to the first floor and into the street.

A fireman, whose name was not ascertained, ran into the residence of Mr. Sam Cohen, on Grace Street, during the burning, and stated that one of the men working on the roof of the Cohen store had lost his clothing by fire.

Miss Johnson's Establishment Was Damaged But Little. The splendid work of the fire department is attested by the fact that the W. L. Johnson undertaking establishment, just to the rear of the Meyer store, was damaged very slightly indeed by fire.

The building is a three-story brick structure and is removed from the Meyer building by only the width of a narrow alley. The damage altogether by fire, smoke and water will not amount to much more than \$500.

Johnson was one of the first to discover the fire at 10:30. He saw smoke flowing out of the windows and scraps of burning paper floating around.

TWO KILLED BY BOILER EXPLOSION

Plant of Builders' Mfg. Co., in Norfolk, Completely Wrecked.

TERRIBLE HAVOC WROUGHT. Upper Part of Forty Horse Power Boiler Was Hurled Through Top of Building and Fell in a Lot a Hundred and Fifty Feet Away.

(Special Dispatch to The Times.) NORFOLK, Va., April 10.—The training ship Hartford, once Farragut's flagship, came into Hampton Roads to-day from New York.

Again it was reported that a large fire had started at Monroe and Main Streets, and the crowd getting wind of it made a dash for the new scene of excitement.

Thousands left but they came back disappointed, for the alarm was a false one. There is a sneaking suspicion that the Fire Department rang the bells to diminish the crowd, that the firemen might operate more freely.
