THE TABLET WAS UNVEILED Simple But Interesting Exercises at the Virginia Historical Society Building. The unveiling of the Lee tablet on the Virginia Historical Society building occurred yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Though marked by no special ceremonies the occasion was one of great interest.

The tablet was placed on the Virginia Historical Society building on the fact that General Lee resided in the house now occupied by the society. Yesterday was selected as the date because it was the fortieth anniversary of the secession of Virginia from the Union.

Mr. E. V. Valentine read the call upon General Lee by John Janney, of Leesburg, who was president of the Virginia Secession Convention, to come out and serve the Virginia people who placed their hope and confidence upon him. In conclusion he repeated the poem written by Philip Stanhope Worsley on the fly leaf of a copy of the Earl of Derby's translation of the Iliad, which copy was presented by Worsley to Lee. Colonel V. Gordon McCabe, next called upon, and delivered an eloquent address on the life and character of Lee. By request Colonel McCabe repeated the lines written on Lee by Percy Regat, entitled "The Ninth of April." The meeting then adjourned to the outside, where the tablet was unveiled. These are the verses read by Colonel McCabe:

But he, the leader on whose word those captives loved to wait, The noblest, bravest, best of all, hath found a harder fate. Unseathed by shot and steel he passed through many a desperate field, O God, that he hath lived so long, and only lived to die! Along the war-worn wasted ranks that led him to the last, With saddened face and weary pace, he tramped the certain path, Their own hard lot he never forgot; they felt what his must be; What thoughts on that dark hour must wring the heart of General Lee.

The manly cheer with tears was wet, The tears were slowly lowered, As breaking from their shattered ranks, around his steed they crowd. "I did my best for you," 'twas all those quivering lips could say; Ah, happy those whom death hath spared the anguish of to-day!

The memorial is placed to the center of the building and bears the following inscription: "The Residence of General Robert E. Lee, 1861-1865." It is designed simply to mark the house where the great Southern general once lived. The tablet is erected by the A. V. I. Institute of the United States, A. R., and the Virginia Historical Society. These organizations were represented at the unveiling as follows: A. P. V. A., Mrs. Joseph Bryan; Colonial Dames, Mrs. H. A. Claiborne; D. A. R., Mrs. Virginia Hall; Virginia Historical Society, Colonel W. Gordon McCabe; Messrs. Virginia Newton, W. G. Starnard, and R. A. Brooks. Miss Kate Mason Rowland was chairman of the committee in charge of the erection.
