

WAYWARD LAD.

Stole Several Satchels from Rountree & Bro and Sold Them.

Freddie West, a neat and bright-looking lad of twelve, was arrested by Detectives Tomlinson and Gibson yesterday morning on the serious charge of stealing from his employers, H. W. Rountree & Brothers, the bag and trunk manufacturers.

The boy had been going wrong for some time. About two weeks ago the detective department was informed of certain thefts had been taken at a homeless waif. Although employed at the trunk factory his wages were meagre, and with them he had to lodge, feed and clothe himself. His mother is dead, and his father is hopeless.

The boy had been living in a room over a store at Second and Main Streets, where yesterday the detective found his belongings in a trunk in an almost bare room.

When arrested the lad acknowledged his guilt with tears in his eyes. He said he had taken a number of the satchels and sold them to pawn dealers. Two were recovered from Bachrach's place on Ninth Street. The boy sold them for \$1.50. The wholesale price of the satchels was \$3.20 each. Another was taken at Harfield & Bernum's pawnshop on Seventeenth Street, where he had received \$1 for a fine satchel. The pawnbrokers were arrested on the charge of receiving stolen property, and were bailed in the sum of \$300 each for their appearance in the Police Court this morning. The boy was held at the Second Station. He is too young to send to jail and will probably be sent to the Reformatory by Squire Graves this morning.

The pawnbrokers who bought the satchels from the boy had notes purporting to be from his mother, authorizing the sales.

GATTIS-KILGO SUIT

Came Up for Final Argument in the Supreme Court.

(Special Dispatch to The Times.)

RALEIGH, N. C., April 26.—The famous libel case of J. Gattis vs. Rev. John C. Kilgo et al came up for final argument before the Supreme Court to-day. The case comes before the Supreme Court on appeal by the order of the Superior Court, which gave the plaintiff \$20,000 damages. Justice Walter Clark is not sitting on this hearing.

T. T. Hicks presented a brief for the defendants. It was strictly argumentative and occupied twenty-five minutes and argued that a church, college or a body of men could not be sued for libel; that there was no evidence of malice toward the plaintiff, and that there were many errors made in the Superior Court trial at Oxford.

J. Crawford Biggs followed Mr. Hicks. He cited the six charges against Gattis which were contained in Dr. Kilgo's speech before the Board of Trustees of Trinity College in the Clark-Kilgo trial, where Gattis had appeared as a witness for Judge Clark.

These were that Gattis was termed "original slanderer," his store a place of gossip, that \$100 was a high price for Gattis, that he was an assassin of character, "original maligner," and that "he talks so much that the truth has small opportunity in his hands."

Counsel here to participate in the argument for plaintiff are: Ex-Judge A. W. Graham, of Oxford; Mr. A. A. Hicks, of Oxford; J. Crawford Biggs, of Durham, and S. M. Gattis, of Hillsboro. For the defense: Ex-Judge R. W. Winston, of Durham; General B. S. Royster, of Oxford, and T. T. Hicks, of Henderson. The argument continues to-morrow.
