SKETCH OF HIS LIFE.

Rev. Mr. Riddick was one of the best known of the Methodist ministers in Virginia. He was at one time pastor of the Clay-Street Methodist Church, of this city, and was much beloved here. He was recognized as a preacher of great force and eloquence, and has filled various charges most successfully. He was born in Gates county, N. C., August 5th, 1831. He was the son of Christian parents, and was always the conscious subject of deep religious impressions, which finally ripened into a clear and thorough conviction while a student at Randolph-Macon College. It was at this institution that he was educated, called to the ministry and first licensed to preach. He joined the Virginia Conference in the city of Norfolk in the year of 1854, and was appointed by Bishop G. P. Pierce to the charge of the Hertford Circuit. He was ordained deacon by Bishop John Early in 1856, and graduated to elders' orders in 1858, and was ordained to the same by Bishop H. H. Kavanaugh. He has filled the following appointments during his ministry: Hertford, Charles City, Randolph-Macon, Murfreesboro, Harrellsville, and Sussex Circuits, Wesley Chapel (now Central), Portsmouth; Leesburg (now in the Baltimore Conference); Washington Street, Petersburg; Cumberland-Street,
