Calls Attention to the Charges Made by Dr. Sherrill. HAS DISTINGUISHED CALLERS.

PROPERTY STOLEN FROM A CHURCH

Old Monumental. Entered by Thieves on Tuesday Night and Valuable Plate Carried Off.

The police and detectives of this city are actively searching for a large quantity of property belonging to Monumental Church, and also for the thieves who entered the church and carried it off.

Some time during Tuesday afternoon or night the church was entered and a number of valuable pieces of silver and brass plate and other articles carried away.

This is the second time this church has been robbed within two years. About two years ago the building was broken into by two young white men, DeLacy and MacArthur, and several articles, including a Bible and a bunch of flowers, were taken.

TO THE GRAND JURY. Federal Suspects Sent on for the Orange Robbery. James Dillon and Frank Johnson, two of the suspects who have been held in the city jail here by the Federal authorities for the last month, on charges of being implicated in recent postoffice robberies, were given a hearing before United States Commissioner Roper yesterday afternoon, and sent on to the grand jury, which meets in Norfolk on May 14th. Both men were charged with robbing the postoffice at Orange. The authorities introduced several witnesses from the scene of the robbery, who identified Dillon as seen in the town the day before the office was robbed. The following card, a number of which were found on Dillon after his arrest, was identified as the same used by the young man who worked the town of Orange for a day or so before the robbery was committed there: CRIPPLE'S PLEA. What is in this world, Brother? Luxuries for but few. A living left for all the rest, I can't grasp that like you. Accept my poem for a trifle, And I'll be on my way. I know that God will bless you, And a cripple for you will pray. My object is to obtain sufficient funds to place me in some small but honest business in which I can become self-supporting. Kindly give what you can. Dillon is a youth in appearance, though, according to the officers who have worked up his record, he has been on the road some time. Both men were taken back to the city jail, where they will await the action of the Norfolk grand jury. Mr. J. O. Wendenburg, represented the accused, while Mr. Allan, district attorney, conducted the case for the Government.
