STOCKS TURNED UPWARD

Buoyancy of St. Paul Had Strengthening Influence.

BANK STATEMENT WAS WEAK

This Caused a Dip in Prices, but They Rose Again on Heavy Buying of St. Paul.

Speculative Dealers Were Prominent.

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, June 15.—There was a feverish undertone in to-day's stock market, but the buoyancy of St. Paul was a determining factor in sustaining prices and in turning them upward after the dip occasioned by the weak bank return.

Authoritative announcements regarding the developments in the St. Paul continue lacking, but the belief holds in Wall Street that a controlling interest in the stock has been made.

It is a matter of notoriety that when efforts were made to secure St. Paul previous to the Burlington deal the demand for the stock by controlling interests was 200.

There has been a good general demand for bonds, and some of the convertible and contingent issues have been active and strong.

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
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Winners in the Times Children's Art Contest

METHODIST MISSION BOARD. Body Adjourned Yesterday After Concluding its Business.

NASHVILLE, TENN., June 15.—The Board of Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, adjourned this evening. Several appointments for work on the Pacific Slope were approved. The sum of \$15,000 for expenses during the year was appropriated and the report of the Committee on Estimates adopted.

Some discussion on the building to be erected at the Soo Show University, in China, was given by Bishop Wilson, with an estimate of its probable cost, amounting to \$20,000, as coming from its trustees. Cash and subscriptions received for this school amount to \$100,000. The board authorized the trustees to go forward with the building.

His plan for securing the title of the board's property in Japan was adopted. The committee appointed to consider the opening of work in Africa was given another year.

The following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, That this board has received with profound gratification the donation of \$1,000 in four per cent. bonds from one who the love of Christ constrains, and will, with pleasure, apply the income as directed."
