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**GOV. TYLER IN NEWPORT NEWS**

Will Go on From There to Pochontas—Capitol Notes.

Governor Tyler left yesterday afternoon for Newport News to participate in the Bryan meeting there last night. He will not return here to-day, as was first anticipated, but will go on from Newport News to Pochontas, where on Thursday he will deliver a Fourth of July oration. He is expected to return here on Friday or Saturday.

Mrs. Tyler and her daughters will leave next week for a brief visit to friends in Tidewater Virginia, and shortly after their return will go to Radford to spend the summer.

The Board of Public Works will meet to-day to further assess railroad and steamboat property and to set a controversy over a railroad crossing in Norfolk county.

The Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners met in Col. May's office yesterday and decided to buy \$150,000 worth of State bonds this month.

Mr. O. C. Flippin, treasurer of Cumberland, was at the Auditor's office yesterday.

The Summer Normal Schools for the State opened yesterday at Manassas and Marion. The School of Methods opened at Staunton. Indications are that they will be well attended.

The clerks in the offices of Treasurer Harman and Auditor May will be busy some time paying out interest on State bonds, the checks for which reached the bond-holders yesterday.

**OFFICE ABOLISHED.**

Miles W. Williams No Longer Assistant Custodian of Custom-House.

The office of assistant custodian and janitor of the Custom-House has been abolished by the Department at Washington, and as a result Mr. Miles W. Williams, who has held this position, will be retired from the service. The order requires the appointment of a laborer, as janitor, and gives him an assistant in a charwoman. Henry Austin, the old negro, who has held the position since the building has been appointed, and began work yesterday.

The increase in business at the post-office during the last quarter, has necessitated an increase in the clerical force, and yesterday morning three new men were put to work. F. W. Kunkler, in the Money-Order-Department, and James E. Scott and Henry M. Lawder, in the city division.

Sub-stations, No. 8 and 9 were established yesterday at P. M. Slaughter's drugstore, at Twenty-fifth and Venable Streets, and W. F. Warner's pharmacy, on Fifth and Marshall Streets.

The Federal Revenue office here answered the following query which is being asked by many lawyers and clerks throughout the country:

Deeds bearing date prior to July 1, 1901, offered for record after July 1, 1901, under what law are same to be taxed?

Replying to the above inquiry, the Internal Revenue office holds that if such instrument is executed and delivered before the 1st instant the same must be stamped under act of June 13, 1898. The date of the instrument, however, will be presumed to be the date of delivery, unless the contrary is proved.
