AS TO PUBLIC PRINTER. Captain O'Bannon, State Printer, addressed the committee in opposition to removing his office. He said no one but an expert printer could properly perform his duties, and the fact of its establishment after the war was conclusive proof that the State had suffered in its printing bills before its creation. He was in addition to giving out contracts for printing he had to superintend and examine the work of all printing, news accounts, etc., and that all work came up to specifications.

REDUCE TAXATION.

A plan for the reduction of the rate of taxation in the city of Manchester, which has been under consideration some time in the Finance Committee, is taking definite shape and will be submitted to the City Council at its next meeting. The permanent outlook for the city is considered encouraging, and it seems that this reduction can be made without subjecting the city to any loss or embarrassment. The rate of taxation will be lowered 25 cents on the \$100 as this, and possibly more as soon as the city's revenues will permit. This plan has been discussed in lengthy sessions of the committee and can be adopted at any time.

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FIRST PLANS FOR GREAT CARNIVAL

Richmond's October Festival Will Rival New Orleans' Mardi Gras.

REX WILL REIGN IN THE CITY.

Industrial Development Will Be Shown in All Departments—Military and Floral Parades to Surpass Those of Former Carnival.

As the preparations for the Carnival progress and the association's plans become better known, the magnitude of the great October festival is better appreciated. Few Richmond people are aware that the management proposes to rival the New Orleans Mardi Gras. From the morning of Monday, October the seventh, till the night of the following Saturday the whole city will be given over to gaiety. King Rex will rule from the turbid tumbling James to the furthest bounds of Barton Heights, and from the Boulevard to Fulton. One hundred thousand dollars will be expended on the Carnival, and day and night the city will go on. Floral parades and the long array of marching regiments, frolics of the "Barques" Band, life-saving drills by the Fire Department, fiery dragons and fairy-like allegorical floats, all will be again with life and movement.

Already ten carloads of materials have come for the grand parade of floats. King Rex will enter the city on the day appointed for the assumption of his royal authority, attended by throngs of marshals, seneschals, high chamberlains and courtiers. First in line will march the regiments of the city, and then the regiments of the State, followed by the regiments of the nation.

GOOD ROADS TRAIN.

Good Work Done by Experiment of National Good-Roads Association. (By Associated Press.)

CHICAGO, ILL., July 27.—The National Good Roads train, equipped three months ago with engineers and road experts, has completed its trip. President Moore, of the National Good Roads Association, reports that the train has made an early start in 1901, and that it has carried more than forty thousand passengers to the various conventions, constructed a little over twenty miles of carth road and five miles of macadam.

Work of Trotters and Pacers at D. R. H. Club Track.

DOUBTFUL SHOWS FAST MILE.

Robert Waddell's Name—Death of Hamble Virginia-Cox Yearlings in England—Breedy Wins at Detroit.

George R. Richmond, who has a stable of ten horses at the mile track of the D. R. H. Club, worked out a portion of his string during the past week and feels well pleased with them. The black pacing gelding Doubtful, by Bald Chief, dam by Yellow Jacket, worked the latter half of the mile in 2:15, later half in 1:08. She owned by Wm. H. Bradburn, Leveer, the bay gelding, by A. L. Kempland, out of Laurel B., dam of Laurels, 2:15 1/4, by Sable Wilkes, trotted a mile in 2:21, later half in 1:10. Lizzie S., the bay mare by Jake, dam by a son of Mambrino Patchen, went a mile on the trot in 2:15 1/4, later half in 1:08. She owned by Mr. Thomas Atkinson and is one of the clearest roadsters around these parts. Lizzie has no record, but Richmond expects to mark her this season. With the handiest gelding, Moody T. bred and owned by W. S. Forbes, Richmond is particularly well pleased. With scarcely more than road work Moody can trot in 2:30 quite handsly and with good looks and a bined perfect manner, the chestnut mare Ethel Ingram, 2:15 1/4, is probably the best known member of the stable, as she raced so successfully through the North Carolina circuit last fall. She is owned by E. S. Saunders, Jr., and recently worked an easy quarter in 33 seconds, but may not race this season on account of being troubled with a quarter crack. When right and in the saddle she is a real beauty, as she is bred, head and courage, and richly should not be a daughter of the famous pacer John R. Gentry, 2:06 1/2, out of Blondette, dam of Governor 1:02, 2:15, by Leland.

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
