

MAJOR TAYLOR DIED YESTERDAY

Venerable Postmaster of Island Passes Away.

AN OLD VIRGINIA GENTLEMAN. Came of a Prominent Family and Was Highly Esteemed by All Who Knew Him—He Leaves Several Children and Many Grandchildren.

Major James Marshall Taylor died about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Walter A. Williams, on West Grand Street. He was nearly eighty years old and was widely known and highly esteemed throughout Eastern Virginia.

Major Taylor was born at Taylorsville, in Hanover, on April 27, 1822. He was the son of William Day Taylor, who married the daughter of Chief Justice Marshall.

Major Taylor was one of the oldest Masons in the State, and was a member of Dove Lodge, No. 51. He was also a Knight Templar.

The funeral will take place from All Saints' Church at 4 P. M. to-day, and the interment will be made in Hollywood. The following will be the honorary pallbearers:
