

**TWO COMPANIES ARE INSPECTED**

Col. Stern Begins His Work in 70th Regiment.

A FINE SHOWING IS MADE.

Companies A and B Inspected Last Night and Companies C and H Will be Tonight—Fob Presented to Captain Saville.

The annual inspection of Companies "A and B" of the Seventieth Virginia Regiment of Infantry, was held last night. The companies were inspected by Inspector-General J. Lane Stern.

Company A, under command of Captain Charles O. Saville and Lieutenants J. E. Cherry and H. G. Dickerson, formed in the company's room at 8:30 o'clock and marched to the drill hall, where they were inspected. The company made a fine showing and had 58 out of 59 men in line. Company "B," under Captain A. W. Miller and Lieutenants Mathews and Starke, were inspected at 9 o'clock. This company appeared with fifty men out of sixty on roll.

Colonel Stern was assisted in the inspection by Adjutant C. Gray Bossieux. These officers were much pleased with the appearance of both companies.

The drill hall was filled with ladies, military men and other friends of the regiment. A score of the old Richmond Grays, Company C, were present, and applauded their company on its fine appearance.

**JOB FOR CAPTAIN SAVILLE.**

Captain Charles O. Saville, the popular commander of Company A, was taken by surprise shortly after his company returned from the inspection to their room.

Captain C. S. Crawford, former captain of Company A, stepped to the center of the room and requested of Captain Crawford said: "Captain Saville, in behalf of the fine body of men under your command, allow me to present to you this little token of their esteem."

He exhibited a handsome gold fob bearing the monogram of "R. G. S." on one side and on the reverse "Charles O. Saville." Captain Saville was taken by such surprise it was several minutes before he could reply. He responded in a few remarks thanking his men for the token of their affectionate regard.

The company and their friends, with the officers of the regiment, were invited to partake of cream and cake and cigars as guests of the officers of Company A.

The regimental band of the Seventieth Regiment held an important meeting at the army last night. The band will be reorganized in the near future and will be increased in size.

**TER-CENTENNIAL.**

Newport News to Make Strenuous Effort to Capture the Celebration.

NEWPORT NEWS, VA., Sept. 17.—Newport News is determined to have the great Ter-Centennial celebration in 1907, the 300th anniversary of the settlement of America by the English at Jamestown, and to-day Acting President Bowen, of the Business Men's Association, appointed the committee, which will go to work at once in behalf of Newport News. This city will undoubtedly have a great celebration here, even though it does not get the one to be authorized by the Legislature.

Ten business and professional men were indicted this morning by the grand jury for doing business without a license. Over fifty men were presented to the jury by the commissioner of revenue. The announcement of the jury's work created quite a sensation, although it was known that Commissioner Crump had warned the offending parties that he would take this step.

The C. P. Huntington Republican League Club to-night held a largely-attended meeting and adopted in its place, on the death of President McKinley. This is the largest and most influential Republican organization in the South.

that for business reasons he has positively refused to allow his name to go before the convention. Mr. R. A. Anderson, editor of the Marion News, is thought to be the choice of the State delegates elected at the meeting of the House Mr. Honaker, of Bland, can be renominated if an aspirant.

The Democrats elected twenty-five delegates with half vote each, to meet at the Washington county delegates. Chilhowie October 1st to nominate a man for the Senate. For this honor Bristol has three candidates—Mr. J. C. Byars, Mr. Ashworth and Mr. Morb. Rich Valley district to-day indicated her delegates for Dr. J. J. Buchanan for senator.

There is considerable talk of Hon. B. F. Buchanan as the senatorial nominee, and he would poll a larger vote in Smyth than any other man should be consent to run.

Mr. W. V. George will be the Democratic nominee for the House, and will make a strong candidate and an active canvasser.

**REV. DR. ARTHUR SUSPENDED.**

Was Charged With Drunkenness—Recently Called to Petersburg.

ROANOKE, VA., Sept. 17.—Montgomery Presbytery met here to-night in the Second Presbyterian Church to consider the charges of drunkenness brought against Rev. James Arthur, D. D., the former pastor, who was recently called to the Tabernacle Church, Petersburg.

The Presbytery met at 8 o'clock and after prayer the Rev. Arthur drank liquor on four occasions, once at the Hotel Roanoke bar, another time at Atlantic City, another at the Montgomery White Sulphur Springs, and the fourth on another occasion.

The Presbytery was in session until 11 o'clock, and touching speeches were made by the ministers, all regretting the charges. Rev. Dr. Arthur also spoke briefly in his defense. He denied three of the charges. The Presbytery, after practically unanimous vote decided to suspend him indefinitely from the discharge of ministerial duties. Rev. Dr. Campbell, pastor of the First Church, was excused from voting, as was also representatives of the Second Church.

The charges against Dr. Arthur created a great sensation in this city.

**Home for Odd-Fellows.**

**Asland Man Shot.**

WINCHESTER, VA., September 17.—An affair which may terminate fatally occurred in North Winchester last night, when Edward Cain shot Isaac Thomas, of Asland, by mistake. Cain intended to shoot his brother-in-law, Russell Williams, with whom he had a quarrel, and fired first as Thomas left a house nearby. Cain and Williams were sent to jail—the latter being sentenced for drunkenness and the former on the shooting charge.

Thomas' left lung was pierced and the bullet has not been found. To-day his condition is critical. The participants are young white men. Intense excitement prevailed in the vicinity.

**Petersburg's Memorial.**

Boiler Makers in Conference With Supr. Doyle—Other Notes.

Committees representing the boiler-makers and the shops of the Chesapeake and Ohio were in conference yesterday with General Manager Doyle. The object of the meeting was not made public.

President Stevens, of the Chesapeake and Ohio, is in Philadelphia, attending a meeting of the directors of the road.

The information sent from Alexandria that the Pennsylvania Railroad would transfer the management of the line between Quantico and Alexandria to the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac road could not be verified here. No one in the local office here knew anything about it when questioned by a Times reporter.

The line in question is twenty-seven miles long, and is under the direct management of the Pennsylvania from Washington to Quantico.

**MR. MONTAGUE AT MANASSAS**

He Went There Yesterday to Make Speech To-Day.

THE CONVENTION AT HANOVER. I Will Renominate Cardwell and Edwards For the House—Mr. Pilcher Will Not Run This Fall—Gossip in the Lobby.

Attorney-General Montague went from Chatham, where he made a speech Monday, to Manassas to attend the fair. He will make a speech there to-day, and is expected back in Richmond next Friday.

There will be two political conventions held at Hanover Courthouse to-day. One will nominate a candidate for the House of Delegates. There is no opposition so far as is known, to the renomination of Capt. W. D. Cardwell. The delegates from Hanover and King William will meet in joint convention and renominate by acclamation Hon. Thos. Edwards, of West Point, for Speaker of the House.

A number of King William Democrats were in the city last night on their way to Hanover. Among them were Mr. Edwards, Commonwealth's Attorney, I. Palmer and Mr. W. D. Pollard.

Mr. Edwards is the law partner of Hon. S. L. Kelley, of Richmond. Capt. Cardwell is a son of Judge Cardwell, and has law offices in Richmond. Both of these young men have made very useful representations.

Hon. T. C. Pilcher, of Fauquier, one of the oldest members of the House, is the champion of Delegates, is at Murphy's. He is not a candidate for re-election. "I could secure the nomination," said he, "but I have decided to retire to private life."

Mr. Moses Green will probably be Mr. Pilcher's successor.

Hon. John J. Owen, of Prince Edward, who has just been returned to the House, is at Murphy's last night shaking hands with friends. It is not likely that he will have any opposition in the general election. Mr. Owen is very popular in his county and would be difficult for any one to beat him.

Captain A. R. Hobbs, who was nominated by the Democrats at Waverly yesterday for the State Senate, to succeed Hon. R. B. Hartley, of Sussex, will not be a stranger in the Legislative hall. He was a few years ago a member of the House. Captain Hobbs resides in the town of Waverly, in the county of Prince George. He is a brother-in-law of Hon. R. G. Southall, of the Constitutional Convention. Col. James Mann, of Nottoway, who came down from Washington last night, having attended the funeral of President McKinley, states that Hon. R. G. Southall will have no opposition for renomination to the House by the Democrats of Nottoway and Amelia. The date for the convention has not been named.

Hon. J. M. Hooker, the delegate of the Constitutional Convention from Patrick, returned yesterday from a rousing home. Mr. Hooker made a rousing Convention at Stuart Saturday. Mr. A. F. Mays, a one-armed Confederate soldier and one of Patrick's most influential citizens, was nominated as a member of the county in the next House of Delegates.

Upon being asked what was the temper of his constituents regarding the Constitutional Convention, Mr. Hooker said: "The sentiment of Patrick are sensible, patriotic. They do not seem disposed to criticize the convention because of the time it has so far consumed. They will heartily support the members of the convention, and will reduce the expenses of running the government. They are thinking more about this matter than any other. I am sure they expect us to abolish all useless offices, regardless of sentiment or official influence. As to the suffrage clause, they seem to sympathize with the laborers on that knotty question and are justly thinking the committee is honestly endeavoring to avoid that question by worthy white man. That is what they want."

"What about the prospects in the Fifth District?" was asked.

"Both the State and county tickets will come up with good Democratic majorities from that district I can confidently predict," replied the well-posted delegate.

Hon. George Y. Hunley, of Mathews, who is being prominently spoken of for the House speakership, was at Murphy's last night shaking hands with friends. He is not as yet a avowed candidate, but is almost certain to enter the race with Mr. Ryan and Mr. Kelley.

Dr. M. Q. Holt, of Surry, and Hon. John E. Moon, of Charlottesville, are registered at Murphy's.

Chairman Doherty, of the City Democratic Committee, has appointed the following committee from the members of the City Committee for the work of drawing up the new by-laws of the committee: Messrs. Saunders, Clay Ward, Hall, Madison, Bargamin, Monroe, Hanke, Jefferson, Hines, Morgan, Hinton, Jackson. Mr. Doherty will be the chairman of the committee ex officio.


