NORTHERN PACIFIC PROBLEM.

Uncertainty of Terms of Settlement Over. comes Speculation-Money Outlook Doubtful-Bonds Steady and Very Dull.

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 .- Speculative senliment continued profoundly dull to-day but instead of the conflicting movements of prices and the confusion which have reflected this condition for some time past, the market sank into a lethargy post, the market same into Even the professional operators seemed to give up the idea of attempting to foreto give up the idea of attempting to foresee the nuture movement of prices. It
would be necessary to ro back a year to
find a similar period of duliness. Last
week's transactions of the stock exchange
fell below the corresponding period of last
year for the first time during the present
calendar year. This fact, and to-day's
goilness, which was even more marked,
are striking evidence of the uncertainty
which has overcome the speculation, due
immediately to the emergency of the
Northern Pacific problem and the disclosure of the fact that the actual terms of
a settlement still remain to be agreed
upon.

While the encumbency of the concilia-While the encumbency of the conciliation Board of Directors, of course, affords a strong guarantee against the quarrel again, the members of that body seem to have practically the whole task yet before them of finding a plan which will be acceptable as a final settlement to both parties and relieve the strained condition growing out of the load of securities carried for control now by means of bank loans. Incoming foreign mails disclose that the importance of this problem is fully recognized throughout the financial world, and its state of suspension acts as a repressive influence on speculation. The continued uncertainty of the money market outlook is another doubtful feature.

continued uncertainty of the money market outlook is another doubtful feature.

Money continues to go to the South and sub-Treasury at New York to remove the surplus in the revenue from the circulation, while sterling exchange rose again to-day. As this marks the process of the remittance for repayment of foreign borrowings, it was not unnatural that the London market should respond with a decline in rates. Money market pressure at Paris and Berlin continues, and the ultimate futures of those market, when the heavy year-end requirements come to be met, is a question still to be solved. New York banks to-Gay had the benefits of payments from the sub-Treasury of almost \$2,000,000 on account of Australlan and Klondike gold.
