Ter-Centenary for This City Now Seems Assured—Committees Hard at Work.

ANDALUSIA, Ala., Dec. 6.—Sheriff Johnson of Covington county, this afternoon was informed that a mob from Opp would attack the jail at Andalusia to-night for the purpose of lynching the twenty-five negroes implicated in the killing of the town marshal and a merchant at Opp Wednesday.

News has just been received here, yesterday morning, a negro committed suicide near Opp. He was being pursued by a posse with bloodhounds, and seeing that escape was impossible, the black shot himself.
