

NORTH CAROLINA CITY SCHOOL MEN

Suit Against Raleigh for Some Old Railroad Bonds.

LOST FOR MANY YEARS

RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 25.—The North Carolina city school superintendents adjourned today, after electing the following officers: President, R. J. Tighe, Asheville; vice-president, H. P. Harding, Oxford; secretary, W. C. Allen, Waynesville.

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina Teachers' Assembly met here this morning and decided to hold the 20th session from Jan. 29th to 31st at a place yet to be selected.

SUIT AGAINST THE CITY. The State Treasurer began to-day a suit against the city of Raleigh for the collection of \$14,000 in old railroad bonds, issued in 1868 for the construction of the Charlotte, Felt and...

The bonds have been misplaced for many years, and were only found a few days ago, thrown back among some old worthless papers.

The J. W. McLaughlin Company of Radford, Va., was chartered to-day, with \$100,000 authorized capital. The company will do a general mercantile business.

RECTORY ON FIRE. The rectory of the Church of the Good Shepherd was badly damaged by fire yesterday morning. Dr. Pittenger, the rector, estimates the loss at \$10,000. The fire broke out in the roof, and there is no clue to its origin.

Third Vice-President F. S. Cannon, of the Southern Railway, has written a letter to the superintendent of the shops at Salisbury and Spencer, declaring all employees who refuse to participate in the late strike of machinists in the shops at those places removed, so that the erstwhile strikers are free to be re-employed in the shops there and elsewhere.

The strike has been dragging its weary length along since last May, and was declared off by resolutions adopted by the machinists January 15th.

DAY IN THE POLICE COURT. Long Docket and Argumentative Lawyers Dragged Out Session.

Facing an extraordinarily long docket and half a score of argumentative lawyers, Justice Crutchfield in the Police Court yesterday held a long session here he had for many months, leaving the court at 11:30 minutes to a 1 o'clock, having begun at half-past 3. There were several cases before him which consumed time through the arguments of lawyers, pro and con, and before the end of the docket was reached Justice Crutchfield was looking both weary and an increase of the vaudeville players at the Bijou were in court as spectators until they had to go to the matinee.

First came Harry Smith, a white boy, who seemed to be in bad luck. He had been arrested on a charge of larceny, and he had earned his living since he had been here he was discharged. John Thomas, a negro, cut Bettie White about the head and shoulders with a knife. On examination in the Police Court it appeared that he had several times before cut the same woman, once across the face, and on the specific charge of yesterday, combined with his past record, he was sent to jail for twelve months in default of bond.

Libson Alexander, accused of entering the house of Mr. Charles J. Cook and stealing clothing and a watch from his room, was sent along to the Hustings Court. Dave Hanley, who, it is alleged, held up and robbed Robert M. Hardy on Friday night, securing a gold watch, was sent to the grand jury. John Murray, who had been arrested with him for complicity, was discharged, on two charges, one of carrying concealed weapons and the other as a suspicious character. He had the stolen watch when he was arrested, but said another man had given it to him. He was sent to jail as a witness against Hanley.

BOY'S HURT UNPUNISHED. Winston Fleming Discharged for Injury Done to Hunton Stag.

Through the failure of the prosecution to establish the fact of either fast driving or recklessness on the part of Winston Fleming, Fleming was dismissed in Police Court yesterday on the charge of having carelessly run down and injured little Hunton Stag, in Franklin Street. This was in last November. The boy was so injured that it was necessary to remove his skull and the doctor stated in court that now it is possible to watch the pulsations of his brain through the thin covering which protects it. The hole made was about as large as a dollar.

Mr. Louis O. Wendenburg appeared for the prosecution, and Mr. Edwin P. Cox appeared for the defense. Several witnesses were examined, and the fact was shown positively that at the moment the child was seen by the driver he was directly under the horse's hoofs; that he had apparently run out there, and that there was no possibility of the horse being stopped or turned in time to save him.

In his summing up Mr. Wendenburg declared that the offense was one which it was not possible to punish properly under the present laws. The child's future life, he declared, had been ruined by the negro's carelessness. On the evidence, however, Justice Crutchfield said there was nothing which would warrant him in punishing the driver, and he was allowed to go.

CLIPPER SHIPS They Can Outstrip the Best Yachts That Sail the Sea.

The Shamrock II is credited with a speed of over fourteen knots an hour for short distances, when everything was in her favor. The Valkyrie II, at her best, has sailed at a speed of fully fourteen knots for as much as ten minutes together. For long runs in cruising rig no yacht has ever exceeded eleven knots an hour. The Aberdeen clippers of the early '60's were the first craft to show what could be done in the way of speed under sail. The Maid of Judah in 1860 made the passage from London to Sydney in seventy-eight days. The Lillies, a clipper of 1,965 tons, took troops from Dublin to Gibraltar in four days, and later sailed from Liverpool to Melbourne in seventy-nine days. On this occasion she logged 355 miles a day for several days in succession. This is more than one-third as fast again as the Valkyrie II's best record.

The well-named Hurricane of the Thames and Mersey line came home once from Melbourne in seventy-four days. On this occasion she achieved what is regarded as a world's record for speed. She ran 270 miles in sixteen and one-half hours—a speed exceeding sixteen miles an hour, a performance that her builders and owners might well be proud of.
