## HOUSE WILL PASS BLAND BILL TO-DAY

Has Been Ordered to its Engrainment.

### BUSY LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS

Senate Passes Resolution for Better Protection of Oysters—Mr. S. H. Bond Elected Judge for Scott County. The Day's Proceedings.

The Legislature did a good day's work yesterday after resting on Sunday. The Senate session was short, but that of the House lasted for two hours. Both branches elected Mr. S. H. Bond to succeed the late R. K. Kane as Judge of the County Court of Scott.

The House ordered the Bland quarantine bill to its engrainment after further debate. This foreshadows its passage to-day. The Senate adopted a joint resolution appointing a commission to act with a similar one from Maryland to consider laws for the protection of the oyster industry.

There was a large attendance of members on the House side, and many visitors of distinction were on the floor, including Mrs. A. J. Montague with a party of lady friends. There were a great many new measures presented in both branches, but they were for the most part local in their nature. The two Houses will meet at noon to-day.

To amend section 44 of the Code in relation to correction of erroneous assessments. For the relief of Joseph R. Bunting. For the relief of A. W. McKim, treasurer of Page County.

When the routine business of the morning hour had been disposed of, Mr. Whitehead was recognized to speak against the Bland Quarantine Measure. He wanted the bill recommitted and said practically all the cities and towns of Tidewater would send representatives here to fight its passage. He moved that it be committed to the Committee on Manufactures and Mechanics arts of which Mr. Bland is chairman.

Mr. Bland was about to reply, when he yielded for a motion to go into the election of a judge of the County Court of Scott, to succeed the late Judge R. R. Kane. The Senate agreed to the joint order moved by Mr. Carter, of Scott and that gentleman placed in nomination the name of Mr. Samuel H. Bond. There was no opposition and Mr. Bond was chosen by a unanimous vote of both Houses.

The Speaker laid before the House a letter of thanks, declining the use of its hall by the Constitution Convention, which was read by the clerk.

**BLOOD BILLS AGAIN.** When consideration of the Bland bill was resumed, the patron spoke against Mr. Whitehead's motion to recommit and declared that it was the most nonsensical suggestion he had ever known the member from Norfolk to make.

He said there had been a complete understanding between the representatives from Norfolk and Portsmouth as to the bill, and that it had been presented with the assent of Mr. Whitehead. He earnestly pleaded against a recommitment of the bill, and said its passage was only simple justice to the people of Portsmouth. He charged that Mr. Whitehead desired to kill the bill when he asked that it go to the Committee on Manufactures and Mechanics Arts, and that it was like sending a horse to a baker's shop to be shod.

Mr. West, of Loudon, made a witty speech on the controversy between Messrs. Bland and Whitehead. He wanted an immediate vote. Mr. Sebrall, of Southampton, spoke warmly and earnestly in favor of recommitting the bill, and said his people had asked that he pursue this course, as its passage meant a great deal to the health of his section.

Mr. Whitehead changed his motion so as to commit to the General Laws Committee. The Chair (Mr. Hunley) ruled that this question had been once voted upon and Mr. Whitehead's motion was, therefore, out of order. He withdrew it and moved to recommit the bill by which the House had heretofore refused to commit the bill.

**ORDERED TO ENGRAMENT.** Mr. Christian opposed a reconsideration and thought the bill should now be finally disposed of. He and Mr. Whitehead engaged in a brief running debate. Mr. Sebrall interrupted to ask Mr. Christian if he was not an undertaker, and "interested in dead folks."

"That's my profession," answered the member from Richmond, "and great thanks to God, my business is to get people up their estates after they are dead."

Mr. Green favored reconsideration, and said it would be bad for the whole State to put any more plums in the way of the warring factions in Tidewater Virginia. "Don't throw any more meat in that cage," he said, amid laughter. The House again, by a large majority, refused to reconsider, and the bill was put upon its third reading.

Mr. Whitehead read at the desk numerous papers from Norfolk, asking that the bill be not passed, and Mr. Caton took the floor to oppose the bill. He said he had become convinced that the bill would be dangerous in its operations to people all along Tidewater, and he sincerely hoped it would not pass.

The bill was ordered to its engrainment.

**PLACED ON THE CALENDAR.** The following House bills were placed on the calendar:

By Mr. Folkes: To amend and re-enact an act entitled "an act to incorporate the Children's Home Society of Virginia. Approved January 30, 1900."

By Mr. Smith, of Lees: To sell church property in Lee county, Va.

By Mr. Elkins: To authorize the Board of Supervisors of Page county to increase the levy for purposes in Shenandoah Iron Works District in said county.

By Mr. E. C. Jordan: To enable the stockholders of the Winchester and Potomac Railroad Company to fix the date for the annual meeting of said Winchester and Potomac Railroad Company and of the stockholders thereof.

By Mr. Woodward: To incorporate the Virginia Savings Bank and Trust Company.

By Mr. Duke: For the relief of J. C. Hine.

By Mr. Taylor: To make it unlawful to entice away or interfere with a person lawfully bound to another.

By Mr. Bowman: To incorporate the Catawba Valley Railway and Mining Company.

By Mr. Sipe: To amend the code in regard to persons accused of crime to testify in their own behalf so as to allow for cross-examination and impeachment.

By Mr. Weaver: For the relief of P. L. Osborn, of Grayson county.

By Mr. Cummings: Making it a misdemeanor for any person to wear a badge or emblem of secret order unless such person is a member of such order.

By Mr. Folkes: To fix the salaries of guards at penitentiary.

By Mr. Cummings: Authorizing the supervisors of Elizabeth City county to pay the electric light and heat in the county jail.

By Mr. Cummings: To amend the code (section 322) in relation to appeals.

By Mr. Garnett: To amend the code (section 2035) in relation to what shall constitute a lawful fence.

By Mr. Jennings: To provide for collection of fees of clerks of courts.

By Mr. Duke: For the relief of C. M. Erbenbright.

**BILLS PASSED.** Senate bill to amend and re-enact section 6 of an act entitled an act to incorporate the town of Herndon, in the county of Fairfax.

House bill to amend and re-enact an act entitled an act to provide a road law for Campbell county, approved March 5, 1900, providing and regulating a road board for said county, and directing the disbursement of the county funds.

House bill to permit Robert T. Blake, of Middlesex county, to erect an oyster house and breakwater on Rappahannock river.

A bill to regulate and restrict shooting and to prevent the destruction of wild birds in the waters of Back bay and its tributaries in the county of Princess Anne.

House bill to amend section 12 of chapter 23 of Acts of Assembly of session of 1897 and 1898 in relation to the working of roads in the counties of Scott and Lee.

House bill for the relief of F. P. Oakes and D. C. Parker, deputy treasurers for G. H. Vaden, treasurer of Pittsylvania county, Virginia, giving them further time.

House bill to allow J. S. Goody and Brothers to erect a wharf or pier in front of their oyster house on the creek known as Long Reach, Accomac county, Va.

House bill to allow J. T. Chandler to erect a wharf or pier on Long Reach, Accomac county, Va.

House bill to amend and re-enact an act relating to unlawful hunting in the counties of Spotsylvania and Prince George.

House bill to amend and re-enact an act relating to the protection of partidges or quail in the county of Stafford, Va.

House bill to incorporate the Richmond Methodist Mission Association.

House bill to authorize and empower William B. Bloom to build a pier and watch-house in James river at the mouth of Pagan creek.

House bill to authorize the Old Dominion Land Company to erect, construct, and fill in system of wharves and piers and bulkheads in James river in the city of Newport News.

House bill to define a trespass by hogs for the county of Tazewell.

House bill to allow the firm of Craile, Hubbard & James to build a wharf in Lancaster county, Va.

House bill to protect Mongolian or English pheasants in Rockbridge and Augusta counties.

House bill to authorize Beach Park and Hotel Company of West Point to erect wharves, docks, or piers on its lots in the town of West Point, King William county on the York river.

House bill to incorporate the Harrisonburg Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

House bill to ratify, confirm and validate the action of the Council of the city of Danville, Virginia, in passing an ordinance on the 12th day of November, 1901, providing for a special election on the 19th day of November, 1901.

House bill to amend and re-enact section 1, chapter 8, of the charter of the city of Danville.

House bill to incorporate the Progressive Mutual Live Stock Association of Accomac county, Virginia.

House bill to incorporate the Atlantic District Live Stock Association.

House bill to appropriate \$3,451.23 of the public moneys for the purpose of discharging the indebtedness of the Southwestern State Hospital.

House bill for the relief of J. L. Yingling from the operation of an erroneous entry on the assessor's books of Roanoke county, growing out of a clerical error.
