

NEW MAKES A RADICAL SPEECH Favors Federal Supervision of Elections. LISTENED TO CLOSELY

CHINESE EXCLUSION BILL Senate Failed to Agree on Time to Vote on the Measure—Mr. Grosvenor Claimed that Reciprocity was a Republican Principle, and Said that Tariff Would Have to be Revised.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—An effort was made late today in the Senate to obtain an agreement upon a time for a vote on the Chinese exclusion bill, but it was unsuccessful.

Three speeches were made against the Chinese bill in its present form. Mr. Bingham, of Vermont, concluding his remarks, and Mr. Stewart, of Nevada, and Mr. Hoar, of Massachusetts, stating their objections to the bill.

Mr. Stewart said he would vote for the measure if it was the best that could be obtained, as he favored the exclusion of Chinese laborers, but he was opposed to many of the provisions of the measure.

Resolved, That the qualifications of citizens entitled to vote for United States Senators and representatives in Congress shall be uniform in all States, and Congress shall have power to enforce this article, by appropriate legislation.

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ARMY WISHES TO HOLD GRIP Would Like to Keep Control of Philippines Twenty Years. MAJOR GARDENER'S REPORT

This is Matter on Which General Miles' Letter Was Based, and Had Been Withheld by the Secretary of War. (By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Senator Lodge chairman of the Philippine Committee, laid before that committee the report of Major Cornelius Gardener, civil governor of the province of Tayabas, which reference was made by General Miles in his correspondence with Secretary Root.

General Miles' report had been withheld and this caused the adoption of a resolution at the last meeting of the committee requesting the Secretary of War to send the report to the committee.

The governor recommends that the operations against the insurgents should be by force of natives. He says: "As civil governor I feel it my duty to say that it is my firm conviction that the United States troops should at the earliest opportunity be concentrated in one or two garrisons, if it is thought desirable that the good sentiment and loyalty that formally existed toward the United States Government among the South and West should be conserved and encouraged."
