Mayor Taylor was fairly bubbling over with gratitude and thanksgiving to the people of Richmond yesterday on account of his splendid victory. He was shaking hands and receiving congratulations at his office nearly all day, and was apparently very happy. Captain McCarthy was in his office during most of the day, and did not seem to have lost any sleep over his defeat. He was as bright and cheerful as the day he announced his candidacy, and looked as happy as if he had been the winner instead of Mayor Taylor.

EPPS CONGRATULATED.

Hon. John E. Epps' friends fairly showered him with congratulations yesterday on his fine victory for Sheriff. Mr. Epps is at present the city gauger of Richmond, but will, of course, not be a candidate for re-election by the incoming Council. The office is not a very lucrative one, and Mr. Epps is satisfied with what the people did for him on Thursday. It is not known what business Sheriff Hughes will follow after July 1st, when his term will expire and he will give his office up to Mr. Epps. Before his election as Sheriff he was a commission merchant, and he may re-embark in that line. He has nearly three months in which to make his plans, and will no doubt settle them in that time.

LEADERS OUT.

Local politicians were plentiful around Murphy's last night, and they discussed the results of Thursday's battle with much interest. President W. M. Turpin, of the Board, was on hand, and was warmly congratulated on his triumphant re-nomination. Alderman King and Councilman McCarthy were out for a while, and were consulting each other upon their political reverses.

Capt. John A. Curtis and Capt. Chas. F. Taylor discussed the situation with their friends, and were apparently well satisfied with the result.

Councilman Joseph W. Wellerstein, who was defeated for re-election on Thursday, was kept busy yesterday receiving his friends, who came to offer their regrets at his failure to be returned. Mr. Wellerstein is regarded as one of the best business men in the lower branch.

IN CLAY AND LEE.

Messrs. Seay and Cottrell were easy winners for the Board in Clay Ward. Mr. Miner goes back to the Council, but all his colleagues are new men. Mr. Gibson fell "outside the brackets" of the new members being General A. L. Phillips and Messrs. Crenshaw, Heslep and Bottom.

In Lee Ward Messrs. Minor, Gilman and Sheppard were named for the Board without opposition. Messrs. Blanks and Cottrell were named for the Board in Clay Ward. Mr. J. E. Epps ran ahead of Hughes in Madison, Jackson, Clay, Lee and Monroe, but Hughes was the leader in Marshall and Jefferson.



SOME INTERESTING FACTS.

A study of the votes for the three contested offices is a matter of especial interest. Of the total vote of the city, which was just a dozen short of ten thousand, 282 persons did not vote for either candidates for the office of Mayor. Mayor Taylor received 3,416 majority over Captain McCarthy. Only the total vote of thirty, 62 per cent. voted for Mayor Taylor and 28 per cent. voted for Captain McCarthy. Captain McCarthy did not carry a single precinct. He received his largest vote in Monroe Ward—576. First Clay gave him his largest precinct vote—388. He came nearest to carrying First Lee than any other precinct, being defeated by 28 majority. He received something of a vote in every precinct—one in Second Jackson.

IN CLAY AND LEE.

In Third Clay than any other precinct—565. Claiborne Epps led Smith in Madison by 127, in Lee by 490, and in Monroe by 269. Smith led him in Jackson by 185, in Jefferson by 367, and in Clay by 99. If the committee reduces Smith's 463 in Second Marshall to 363, he will still lead Epps by 183 in Marshall Ward, but will be defeated in the city by 52 majority.
