TO DIVIDE UP THE NEW JUDGES Organic Provision Raises Vexed Questions—All Candidates Want Long Terms.

The object of this is obviously to prevent combinations that would inevitably result from having all the circuit judges in the State chosen at one time.

BOARD MEMBERS TO QUALIFY Secretary of the Commonwealth Sending Papers to New Registrars.

Assistant Secretary Hankins is busy sending out blanks and papers of qualification for the members of the new registration boards. The following extracts from the registration ordinance will be helpful to the members of the boards and to the public generally.

The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall have prepared suitable books for the registration of voters and forward them to the clerk of the County Court of each county, and to the clerk of the Corporation Court of each city, to be therein distributed to the several boards of registrars of their respective counties and cities.

The books shall be so spaced and ruled as to provide for the convenient entry of the number and name of the voter, in alphabetical order, his age, occupation, residence, length of time he has resided in the State, and county and precinct in which he is a naturalized citizen, the date of his naturalization papers and the court by which issued, if known; and, if registered as a voter exempt from the payment of a poll tax as a prerequisite to the right to vote, under section twenty-two of the Constitution, for the statement of that fact.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, before the twentieth day of July, nineteen hundred and twenty, to forward to each of the persons named by the convention as members of the several boards of registration, a certificate showing that such person has been so chosen, which certificate shall be evidence of the facts therein stated. Upon the receipt of such certificate, the member of the Registration Board named therein shall signify his acceptance in writing to the clerk of his county, or the clerk of the Hustings or Corporation Court of his city, upon blanks to be furnished by the Secretary of the Commonwealth.

The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall, with said certificate, send to each member of said board a copy of the Constitution and this registration ordinance.

On or before the first day of September, nineteen hundred and twenty, the Secretary of the Commonwealth and city shall prepare for each county and city a list of each district or ward of his county or city a certified list containing the names of all persons within such district or ward, who for the year nineteen hundred and one, have paid as much as one dollar in State tax for property owned by and assessed against them, or have been the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall furnish to said boards a similar list of those who, for the year nineteen hundred and two, have paid as much as one dollar in State tax for property owned by and assessed against them.

The books and blank forms to be prepared by the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall be provided at the expense of the State; but all other costs and charges of registration, including postage, stationery and publication of notices, shall be defrayed by the counties and cities in which such registration is held.

Following is a copy of the blank commissions used by the Secretary of the Commonwealth of Virginia: "This is to certify, that by an ordinance of the Constitution Convention, which assembled in the city of Richmond on the twelfth day of June, 1901, was chosen a member of the Board of Registrars of the County of ... Magisterial District of the county of ... under my hand at Richmond, this 30th day of July, A. D. 1920."

"Secretary of the Commonwealth." The following blank form is being sent to the registrars upon which to notify the clerks of their acceptance: "To the Clerk of the ... Court of the County of ... Virginia: "In accordance with a requirement of the Registration Ordinance adopted by the Constitution Convention which assembled in Richmond on the twelfth day of June, 1901, I hereby notify you that I accept office as a member of the Board of Registrars of the County of ... Magisterial District of the county of ... under my hand this the ... day of ... 1920."

BOARD MEMBERS TO QUALIFY Secretary of the Commonwealth Sending Papers to New Registrars.

Assistant Secretary Hankins is busy sending out blanks and papers of qualification for the members of the new registration boards. The following extracts from the registration ordinance will be helpful to the members of the boards and to the public generally.

The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall have prepared suitable books for the registration of voters and forward them to the clerk of the County Court of each county, and to the clerk of the Corporation Court of each city, to be therein distributed to the several boards of registrars of their respective counties and cities.

The books shall be so spaced and ruled as to provide for the convenient entry of the number and name of the voter, in alphabetical order, his age, occupation, residence, length of time he has resided in the State, and county and precinct in which he is a naturalized citizen, the date of his naturalization papers and the court by which issued, if known; and, if registered as a voter exempt from the payment of a poll tax as a prerequisite to the right to vote, under section twenty-two of the Constitution, for the statement of that fact.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, before the twentieth day of July, nineteen hundred and twenty, to forward to each of the persons named by the convention as members of the several boards of registration, a certificate showing that such person has been so chosen, which certificate shall be evidence of the facts therein stated. Upon the receipt of such certificate, the member of the Registration Board named therein shall signify his acceptance in writing to the clerk of his county, or the clerk of the Hustings or Corporation Court of his city, upon blanks to be furnished by the Secretary of the Commonwealth.

The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall, with said certificate, send to each member of said board a copy of the Constitution and this registration ordinance.

On or before the first day of September, nineteen hundred and twenty, the Secretary of the Commonwealth and city shall prepare for each county and city a list of each district or ward of his county or city a certified list containing the names of all persons within such district or ward, who for the year nineteen hundred and one, have paid as much as one dollar in State tax for property owned by and assessed against them, or have been the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall furnish to said boards a similar list of those who, for the year nineteen hundred and two, have paid as much as one dollar in State tax for property owned by and assessed against them.

The books and blank forms to be prepared by the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall be provided at the expense of the State; but all other costs and charges of registration, including postage, stationery and publication of notices, shall be defrayed by the counties and cities in which such registration is held.

Following is a copy of the blank commissions used by the Secretary of the Commonwealth of Virginia: "This is to certify, that by an ordinance of the Constitution Convention, which assembled in the city of Richmond on the twelfth day of June, 1901, was chosen a member of the Board of Registrars of the County of ... BOARD MEMBERS TO QUALIFY Secretary of the Commonwealth Sending Papers to New Registrars.

Assistant Secretary Hankins is busy sending out blanks and papers of qualification for the members of the new registration boards. The following extracts from the registration ordinance will be helpful to the members of the boards and to the public generally.

The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall have prepared suitable books for the registration of voters and forward them to the clerk of the County Court of each county, and to the clerk of the Corporation Court of each city, to be therein distributed to the several boards of registrars of their respective counties and cities.
