He is Building a Passenger Air Ship and Will Compete for Prize at St. Louis.

PARIS, Sept. 6.—Santos-Dumont said to-day to an American correspondent: "I am building a passenger air ship and have already booked two passengers. I shall call it the Santos-Dumont. I will have nine air omnibuses ready in two months large enough to carry ten passengers each."

"I have a special plan for equilibrium, which will practically eliminate pitching. I will take passengers around Paris when the weather permits."

"I will open a booking place similar to the steamship company. At first fares will be high. During fine weather I expect to sail regularly."

"The previous air ships have been built for the purpose of experiments. I have now got beyond the experimental stage, and shall certainly compete for the grand prize at St. Louis."

GREAT SEA WALL FOR GALVESTON

Contract Let for a Granite Concrete and Riprap Defense to Cost Over \$1,000,000.

(By Associated Press.)

GALVESTON, TEX., Sept. 6.—The County Commissioners held a special meeting to-day and awarded the contract for the great sea wall to J. M. O'Rourke and Company, of Denver. The wall will be built of granite concrete and the rip-rap apron in front of the wall will be of sandstone. The bid on this is \$1,198,318, of which \$350,000 will be paid in sea wall bonds at par. The wall is to be finished within fifteen months from commencement of work and the contractors say they will begin actual construction within one month.

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Bicyclist is Run Over and Killed by an Unmanageable Machine.

VINTLAND, N. J., Sept. 6.—One person was killed and two were injured by an automobile here to-day. The dead man was Alonzo Wolberg, aged twenty-seven. His father and a friend were the other victims. Young Wolberg was riding a bicycle. His father and friend were driving a few feet ahead in a carriage. Suddenly an automobile came up from behind. It was going at a high rate of speed and struck young Wolberg. The bicyclist was thrown from his wheel and the automobile passed over his body, killing him instantly. The machine carried Harold Morgan, the eighteen-year-old son of a wealthy Philadelphian, and Miss Lila Barker, of Vineland. Morgan did not appear to have control of the vehicle, and it swept on and collided with the carriage. The occupants of the carriage were thrown out and severely bruised, while the vehicle was wrecked. At the inquest to-night the jury returned a verdict exonerating Morgan from blame, and terming it an unavoidable accident.

SUCCESSFUL RUSE ON PART OF NAVY

Gunboat and Sail Launch Enter Newport Harbor Disguised as Tugboats.

(By Associated Press.)

BLOCK ISLAND, R. I., Sept. 6.—The daring bit of work early Friday morning of Lieutenants Robinson and Hughes in countermine Newport furnished the feature event of the "war game." The details of the dash of the gunboat Peoria into the channels of Narragansett Bay have not appeared because the story of the affair is known only to the participants therein. Those were Lieutenant Robinson and Gunner Avron, of the Alabama, and Lieutenant Charles F. Hughes, of the Massachusetts.

Thursday afternoon the Peoria was painted black, and a large sail launch from the Massachusetts was similarly treated. Provided with mines and cable the Peoria, having in tow the launch, passed into Narragansett Bay, disguised as a tug boat bringing in a disabled schooner. Steaming directly under the guns of Fort Adams the Peoria separated from her tow and grappled for army mines. At the same time Lieutenant Hughes on the launch was laying his mines, and in a moment had connected the circuit which exploded them, thereby blowing up those which the defense might have laid.

The lieutenants marvel to-day that the men behind the shore guns were not suspicious of the dark painted craft busily at work three hundred yards from the shore. Searchlights found them, but there was no idea that they were from the camp of the enemy.

POLES HATE GERMANS

Cermans Detest Poles, and Emperor William Disturbed Over Question.

(By Associated Press.)

POSEN, PRUSSIAN POLAND, September 6.—The Emperor's personal inquiries into the circumstances that aggravate social feeling here probably will result in some measures designed to lessen the local tension.

Archbishop Stabloski Thursday that regretted the fact that the Germans and Poles could not live in the same community without hating each other, and expressed the hope that the force of his feeling might be ameliorated. His Majesty added that he would continue towards it.

The situation certainly is most unpleasant. The Poles refuse to transact business with the Germans, and whenever possible they avoid them, and the Germans buy of German shopkeepers only.

This boycott of race by race is relentlessly enforced through a code of opinion that makes one who breaks it a traitor to his people and unworthy for women to speak to.

What the Poles are especially angry over is the requirement in the schools that the Lord's Prayer must be learned in German. The administration apparently did not force the effect of this order, but it cannot well withdraw it under fire.

The correspondent is informed authoritatively that there is not the least chance of the government giving up its determination to carry out the Polish boycott begun by Prince Bismarck. It is having the effect designed in several generations must win. The Polish outburst of the last few months are only incidents.

MISS MORAN TO WED

Lieut. Hudgins Returns from the Orient to Make Good His Troth.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA., Sept. 6.—Mr. and Mrs. Francis Berger Moran, of "Comyn Hall," have issued invitations to the marriage of their daughter, Miss Helen Adams, to Lieut. John Melton Hudgins, United States navy, the event to take place at Christ Episcopal Church, this city, Thursday, September 15th, at noon.

It will be recalled that the wedding was first set for August, but was postponed because the groom-elect received orders for a long cruise in foreign waters.

SQUADRON WINTERS IN HAMPTON ROADS

Topeka's Injury Was Done by a Government Tug—Both Badly Hurt.

(Special Dispatch to The Times.)

NEWPORT NEWS, VA., Sept. 6.—The North Atlantic Squadron, Rear-Admiral Higginson, will winter in Hampton Roads. Orders probably reached the admiral to that effect yesterday. It is expected in these waters on October 15th. The government is providing for storekeepers' departments at Norfolk, Newport News and Old Point, for the accommodation of the squadron. It is understood that bids for supplies were received in Norfolk yesterday.

It is learned that the tug which bumped into the gunboat Topeka yesterday, was a government tug and not one of the N. Y. P. and N. fleet, as at first reported.

The damage done to the tug was greater than that to the Topeka, which is now at the Norfolk navy yard to go out of commission.

body was removed to Riceville. Here it was recognized as that of a man who had been in the locality for some little time. A number of persons recalled that the stranger had been seen around the town for several days. To some who had talked to him, he had given the name of "William." To others he was "William Boscoe." At a hotel he had registered as "Edward." He disappeared a week ago to-day, and it is presumed it was then that he took his life in despair of eluding the police and in terror of being captured.

Bartholin's note referred to the two murders in Chicago, and declared that no one except himself was concerned in the commission of the crimes. The note filled one half and a quarter of pages of ordinary letter paper, and was signed "William Bartholin."

The letters found on the body were written two years ago and were signed "J. M. M."

The initials are supposed to stand for Minnie Mitchell. The body itself furnished several points, which are similar to those in the amended confession of Bartholin, issued August 13th. Chief of these were the upper false teeth.

The undertaker who handled the body found in Iowa said to-night that the upper teeth were false and "set in a white plate." As to whether there were two gold crowned teeth in the body, another means of identifying Bartholin, the undertaker could not remember, and the body was buried to-day.

Letter of Confession.

(By Associated Press.)

CHICAGO, ILL., Sept. 6.—The confession which was found in the dead man's pocket, and dated August 21, and in it the writer declares that he killed his mother, Mrs. Annie Bartholin, for her money, and later murdered his sweetheart, Miss Minnie Mitchell.

All others who have been arrested in the case are exonerated. In the confession, although Bartholin accuses Minnie Mitchell of being a party to the plot to murder his mother.

The murder of Mrs. Bartholin, the confession runs, was accomplished according to a plot arranged by her two lovers, and later Bartholin killed Miss Mitchell.

FREE CUP OF COFFEE

London Preacher is Introducing American Ideas of Religion.

(By Associated Press.)

LONDON, Sept. 6.—The Rev. Wilson Carlile, honorary chief secretary of the church army, which he founded in the slums in 182, is introducing what is designated here as "American ideas of religion," amended pictures. His latest is a moving picture service, commencing next week. The pictures will be the chief attraction of the midday services at his church in East Cheap. Only sacred representations will be allowed, accompanied by a short address. By this means the Rev. Mr. Carlile hopes to attract Londoners to his church. At the conclusion of the service all the worshippers will be given a free cup of coffee.

FORGER CAPTURED

Has Stolen the Name of J. B. Worth, Jr., of Petersburg, and Much Money.

PETERSBURG, VA., Sept. 6.—Chief-of-Police Ragland received the following telegram to-night from Sheriff E. E. Myers, of Lawrence, Kan.: "I have J. B. Worth, Jr., under arrest; J. B. Worth Company, of Petersburg, offers \$100 reward. Advise immediately, as he is wanted in Topeka, Kan."

Chief Ragland wired back: "Hold him; is wanted in Reading, Wilkesbarre, Kalamazoo and other cities for forgery in each of the above; forged \$100 drafts on J. B. Worth Company."

The identity of the forger cannot be learned to-night, although every effort has been made, as the man under arrest claims to be J. B. Worth, Jr., while the only J. B. Worth, Jr. is in Petersburg and is anxious to face the man who has masqueraded as J. B. Worth, Jr., and who made him and his family suffer to a great extent.
