


The HORSE SHOW

Under Thousands of Electric Lights King Horse Will Begin His Reign on Tuesday Night.

Beneath the glow of more than a thousand lights, amid brilliant hanging colors, swinging in graceful folds over an audience of more than six thousand persons, representing the youth, beauty and fashion of Virginia, Richmond's second annual Horse Show will be opened on Tuesday evening in the amphitheatre at Reservoir Park. For the week the show will continue.

When the last strains of the band's opening march are lost in the hum of voices and the musical laughter, and the clear blast of the bugle calls the first class of the first night's programme to the show ring, beauty's eyes from box and gallery, along the rising rows of seats and around the broad promenade will be turned with adoration, close akin to worship upon King Horse, whose reign for a week has but begun. In this great audience, which will surpass in splendor, fashion and beauty any ever assembled in the Capital of Virginia, will be many of the fairest women of the South and of the nation, and at their sides will be seen gentlemen of the land whose names are known to fame in every valley of American citizenship. All will have come to pay their tribute to the horse.

In harness or in the hunt he holds his place in human hearts and wins the admiration of man's soul. The week will be given to the show, and in fitting fashion will the people pay their homage to the thoroughbred, whose home is Virginia and whose truest lovers are Virginians. For more than two months the show has been the topic, and the supreme event of the special season, which all Richmond has looked forward to and planned for in every way. Richmonders abroad for the summer have hurried home; those at the springs, the seashore and other resorts are back again and are entertaining friends during Horse Show. So society is now gathered anxiously awaiting the events of the coming days, in which they will take so prominent a part.

The success of the show is assured, and that it will surpass in every way the most creditable exhibition of a year ago there is no doubt. The entry list is larger by more than a hundred horses, and among these are indeed some of the best bred about horses

HOME OF THOROUGHBRED

Virginia has been Breeding Place of Fine Horses for More than Century.


More than a century ago Virginia became famous as the birthplace of great racehorses, and during modern years it has ranked any State in the Union as a producer of hunters and jumpers of the highest class. Indeed, so popular have "Virginia bred" cross country horses become in prominent Northern centers, where the largest prices are paid, that the demand far exceeds the supply. To this in a great measure may be attributed the growing interest in horse shows, which not only tend to encourage the production of hunters and jumpers, but also harness horses also. Only a decade since the horse show interest was in its infancy, but well received from its inception, growth has been marvelous, and now we have an established circuit of Virginia shows, made up of Upperville, Berryville, Manassas, Charlottesville, Culpeper, Harrisonburg, Warrenton, Richmond and Lynchburg, with other recruits between the north of Mason and Dixon's line are products of our State. Among those that I recall of hand that have gained national distinction are King Pin, Amaret, Hornpiper, Kinloch, Richmond, Prince William, Jim Crow, Buck, Pamunkey, Nancy Black, Katherine Scott, The Lamb, Tip-Top, Searchlight and Gray Cap.

That horse shows should appeal to and receive the support and encouragement of the best classes in every community is not to be wondered at when we consider the vast amount of good wrought by them. Not only is the production of fine horses encouraged, but there the highest class specimens are seen, and the surroundings are not tainted with objectionable features, so often prevailing in the

prize winners. On Monday morning the prize winners from the Philadelphia Stables of Mr. G. W. C. Drexel will arrive on a special car in a passenger train. Judge Moore, of Chicago, a prominent Western railroad official and president of the Chicago Horse Show Association, who has spent the summer in Virginia, will arrive on Monday morning on a special train over the Chesapeake and Ohio, bringing with him seventeen harness horses and roadsters, which have been prize winners in the Western shows. Judge Moore will bring a large party with him from the Hot Springs and will stop at the Jefferson.

PRIZE WINNERS

His horses are not entered to compete for prizes, as his decision to come to Richmond was not made until after the entries here had closed. Judge Moore comes for the pleasure and pride he takes in showing the splendid string he owns, and while they will be seen in the ring in various classes, they will not be eligible for prizes. T. L. Evans, a student at Richmond Medical College, has entered two highly bred horses. They are both young—only three years old—and very promising. "Squire" is a heavy weight and will be in the heavy weight class. His sire is "Cavalier"; his dam is a three-quarter bred mare. "Fearless Second," the most promising of the two, is light and will appear in the light weight class. His sire is "Hoolford," his dam a thoroughbred Kentucky mare. These horses are really good ones, and will be seen in daily riding.
