

BLUE-BLOODED DOGS FOR FIELD TRIALS

List of Royal Competitors to Meet in Mecklenburg. WILL BE MADE SOCIAL EVENT Many Sportsman of the Old Dominion Will Follow the Inaugural Stakes. Judges Are Chosen—Enjoy National Reputations.

The entry list for the inaugural stakes of the Virginia Field Trials Association is today published for the first time, showing that many of the bluest blooded dogs in the country will be competitors during the trials to be held near Chase City, in Mecklenburg county, the first three days of the coming week.

The list given below is the official one issued by Mr. Charles B. Cook, secretary of the association.

This beginning of field trials in Virginia will be made, incidentally, one of the most delightful events of the winter season in the State.

On Monday night an elegant reception and dance will be given at the Mecklenburg, the new hotel just opened at Chase City, which will be headquarters for the field trial party during its stay. This will be made a social event and most elaborate entertainments have been issued.

For the trials every detail has now been arranged, the officials chosen, the territory laid off, accommodations arranged, and every facility assured.

There are eighteen nominations in the race stake, and when it is considered that big trials are the only ones of the kind that only have a dozen starters, it is readily seen that Virginia sportsmen have taken hold of the new enterprise with determination to rank second to none.

THE BOARD WILL MEET HERE TO-DAY

Plan for the Vigorous Prosecution of the Work.

MR. MASON IS IN THE CITY

Prospect for More Big Sales To-Day. Committee to Straighten Out Certain Things—Nearly 250,000 Pounds Sold Yesterday.

The Board of Governors of the Tobacco Association of the United States will meet here to-day in special session to plan for a more vigorous prosecution of the work of the organization along all lines.

Mr. Thomas Mason, of Cincinnati, the well-known editor of the Western Tobacco Journal, who has recently been elected secretary and treasurer of the organization, reached Richmond yesterday morning in response to a telegram from President Carrington.

Heretofore the burden of the work has been upon the shoulders of the president of the Association, who, as a business man, could not afford to give much time to it.

Two matters of particular importance will be at once placed in the hands of Mr. Mason for development. One of these is the matter of insurance, of which mention has been made before.

It is important to have accurate and thorough data concerning crops, etc., and this the association will attempt to provide. In this connection it will work in conjunction with the Statistical Bureau of the United States Treasury Department.

Prospects are bright for big sales on the local market to-day. Through the rain and the mud many half-frozen farmers drove in last night from the country with tobacco laden wagons.

Nearly 250,000 pounds in all were upon the market yesterday. The sales at the several warehouses were as follows: Sienewall Warehouse, 33,000 pounds; Shelburne Warehouse, 59,000 pounds; Shoekoe Warehouse, 67,000 pounds; and Crenshaw Warehouse, 72,000 pounds; total, 231,000 pounds.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Richmond Tobacco Trade held late Monday afternoon provision was made for a committee of three to be appointed by the president and to enter at once upon the work of straightening out certain matters in connection with the local market.

It is understood that the necessity for the committee arises in part in connection with certain violations of the regulations of the trade with reference to sales upon the loose breaks.
