Session of the House. (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., January 7.—The session of the House today was brief, lasting a little more than two hours. The Senate bill for the redemption of the silver coinage of the Hawaiian Islands was passed after a debate of an hour. The bill provides for the redemption of silver coins by being received either in Hawaii or the United States in payment of duties. The Philippine constabulary bill was made a special order for to-morrow.

ARBITRATION TREATY Mr. Lodge is Authorized to Report Favorably. (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., January 7.—The Senate Committee on Foreign Relations today authorized Senator Lodge to report favorably on the general international arbitration treaty, recommended by the Inter-American conference, held at the city of Mexico last winter. The treaty is on the lines of The Hague treaty, but applies only to the Republics of the Western Hemisphere. It provides a tribunal for settling disputes as to boundary lines and claims; also over other questions concerning which nations may differ. The opinion was quite general that the agreement at this time by the United States would have a good effect upon the settlement of the differences between Venezuela and the European countries in connection with the preparation of the treaty is that the Venezuelan representative in the conference refused, upon the instruction of his government, to participate in the formulation of the document.

SUITS AGAINST TRUSTS Senator Hoar Offers a Companion Measure to His Bill. (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., January 7.—Senator Hoar today introduced a companion bill. It provides especially for the expediting of suits in equity brought under the provisions of the present anti-trust law. The bill is introduced from the General Assembly of the United States to file a certificate in any such case pending in any Circuit Court of the United States to the effect that the case is of general public importance. A copy of the papers in the case is then to be given to each of the circuit judges of the court, and is thereupon to be given precedence over other cases, and to be assigned for hearing at the earliest practicable date. Representative Hoar introduced the same bill in the House.

DR. FOSTER TALKS Wants Separate Apartments for Consumptives. Dr. L. S. Foster, superintendent of the Eastern State Hospital, is in the city, having come up to attend the meeting of the Executive Committee of the hospital. Dr. Foster said the committee only transacted routine monthly business, but that at the proper time it would ask the Legislature for an additional appropriation for completing its new buildings, and to meet current expenses made heavier than last year, and to give the advance in the price of coal and other things. Dr. Foster is an earnest advocate of the establishment of separate apartments at the various State hospitals for consumptives, and a bill for those suffering from epileptic fits. Dr. Foster is opposed to the proposition to colonize the latter, and says they should be in separate apartments at the State hospitals.

Drugs and Animals. (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The Bureau of Chemistry of the Agricultural Department will in a few days begin experiments with animals with a view to determining the effects upon them of drugs used as food preservatives. The new experiments are intended to supplement those now being conducted by Prof. Wiley upon twelve young men who are being given boric acid in their food.

Military Appropriations. (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The House Committee on Military Affairs today concluded the preparation of the military appropriation bill. The bill will carry \$22,500,000, about \$5,000,000 below the estimates. The bill last year carried \$19,250,000. The bill will authorize the Secretary of War to accept \$10,000,000 from the Daughters of the American Revolution for the erection of a memorial building for the physical and moral welfare of the enlisted men at such military post as the Secretary of War may direct.

NORFOLK MATTER GOES OVER A WEEK The President Will Not Make an Appointment for Several Days Yet. (Special Dispatch to The Times.) WASHINGTON, D. REPAIRS MADE TO TOM CUNNINGHAM'S TUG. Cost is Offset by Work Tug Has Done for the Trigg Works. BALANCE VERY SMALL ONE City Engineer Has Advertised for Proposals for Dredging Part Here, and Has Received Four Answers, Which Are Being Considered. Presumably for the purpose of compiling a list of their wants and their expense account for 1903, the Council Committee on the Improvement of James River met last night, but not once during the session, which lasted until one o'clock, of an hour, was this matter referred to, Captain William H. Curtis stating at the adjournment that the list would be made up in the near future. As has been the custom at all meetings held by the James River Committee for the past three months and effort was made last night to put the tug, Thomas Cunningham, Sr., out of commission, Mr. Bloomberg being the patron of a resolution of the kind last night. As usual the motion was voted down, and for at least one more month the tug will remain in commission at an expense of \$813. It is thought that until the new dredging plant has been ordered and completed, probably five or six months, there will be nothing for the tug to do, unless the Council see fit to adopt a recommendation of the committee, which is now pending, authorizing them to lease the vessel to outside parties in the event any one comes along and desires to charter it. A recommendation of this kind was adopted at a meeting last month and would have been acted upon by the Common Council last Monday night had not that body adjourned before having reached the report of the committee. Last night Chairman Curtis was instructed to offer a recommendation of the kind pending recommendation a resolution authorizing the committee to not only lease the tug at such times as it may not be in use by the city, but in addition to lease the dredge or any portion of the harbor machinery.

TUG REPAIRED. Captain Cunningham, in submitting the bills for the past month, explained that the Trigg Company had done work on the tug to the amount of \$138.94, while the city had made a trip to Norfolk and return for the shipyard papers, the cost of which had been \$124.75, or a difference of \$14.19. A bill for this was rendered, and after much discussion ordered paid. Under the usual order of things this action was a little out of the ordinary custom, and in fact, the law upon such matters being that the bill for the cost of the repairs on the tug, while the \$124.75 for the work done by the tug be turned into the treasury of the city. However, in view of the present situation—the receivership of the Trigg Company—the committee deemed it advisable to have the bill made to effect the other leaving a small balance due the company, after which Captain Cunningham explained that he had already taken such action, and, therefore, submitted a bill for a difference between the two accounts.

HAS RECEIVED BIDS. Clerk McDowell reported to the committee that the City Engineer had placed an advertisement in the Engineering News, as instructed in regard to the dredging plant and had received four replies, all of which were being carefully considered. This matter will be taken up in a special meeting to be held in the month of January, when the contract will probably be awarded to one of the four bidders. Captain Cunningham reported that he had seen Mr. J. Clement Shafer, the successful bidder for the Government contract to dredge James River for a distance of four miles below Dutch Gap, and had been informed that he (Mr. Shafer) would probably want to lease the city tug to assist in the work.

A NEGRO ARRESTED Believed That J. R. Overstreet Will Not Be Held for Farrar's Murder. (Special Dispatch to The Times.) BLUEFIELD, W. Va., Jan. 7.—George Turner, colored, otherwise known as "Chicken," who on yesterday gave information which led to the arrest of J. R. Overstreet, charging him with the murder of W. B. Farrar on August 31st, is now under arrest, charged with the crime. John Shafer, a neighbor of the "Chicken," knew a great deal about young Farrar's death, and it is now believed that the guilty party who ever he is will be apprehended. It is possible that "Chicken's" arrest will bring out a sensation in to-morrow's trial.
