STRAIGHTOUTS WIN IN NORFOLK COUNTY

Control of Democratic Machine Passes to Them, LONG AND BITTER CONTEST

The Change Came About by Reason of Death of a Member of the Famous Fusionist Fifteen, Mr. Ross Evans, of Deep Creek.

(Special Dispatch to The Times.) NORFOLK, Va., Jan. 20.—Straightouts control the Democratic machine of Norfolk county. There has been a long and bitter contest between the fusionists and the straightouts of the county. That is ended for the time at least. At a meeting of the Democratic executive committee of Norfolk county this afternoon, on account of the death of member of the famous fusionist fifteen, Ross Evans, of Deep Creek, and the election of a Democrat, E. Nash Billorey, of Deep Creek District, the fusionist control of the political machine of Norfolk county went to the straightouts. This marks the culmination of one of the bitterest fights in the political history of the county.
