

IN POORHOUSE

At Oakland, California, George Edwards, Former Ripley Citizen, Is Dying.

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 8.—George Edwards, 60, who at one time was book-keeper in the Sheriff's office of Hamilton County, Ohio, and later Secretary of the Water Works Commission which built the present Cincinnati water system, is dying at the Alameda County Dispensary, as the result of a second attack of paralysis. He sustained the first stroke during the big fire coming to Oakland later he entered the infirmary.

His wife was the daughter of McEvane, Cincinnati boiler manufacturer. There are two children. A boy, now 20 years old, is employed as an artist by a local moving picture theater, and a girl, 15, lives with the family of Bushnell, a photographer. The wife, who derived an income from her father's property, has not been located.—Cincinnati Enquirer, Jan. 8, 1913.

Mr. Edwards was a one-time crack ball player and a son of the late Mayor Orange Edwards of Ripley.

The General Film Company pleaded guilty at Austin, Texas, to violating the State anti-trust law and was fined \$25,000.

Congressman J. M. Curley was chosen Mayor of Boston by a majority of 6,000 votes over Thomas J. Kenny, president of the City Council.

A committee of naval officers soon will visit Ashland, Paducah and Evansville to inspect sites for the proposed Government armor plate factory.

MILLIONS OF OHIOANS

Under Its Provisions.—New Workmen's Compensation Act Now In Effect.

Columbus, O.—Attorney General Hogan, in an opinion rendered to State Auditor Donahay, summarizes the new compulsory workmen's compensation law, as follows: "All school teachers, regardless of whether they contribute to or receive payments from a pension fund, may receive compensation from the state insurance fund if injured during the performance of their public duties; all appointive township, municipal, county and state employes may receive such compensation; no elective public official is eligible to receive compensation; township road employes and road superintendents may receive compensation, but physicians employed to care for county poor are exempt."

Four-fifths of Ohio's population come under the new compensation act. Over 1,000,000 wage-earners—men, women, boys and girls—will be assured of care should they become victims of industry, and over 3,000,000 women and children—dependents of the wage-earners—are assured of the necessities of life should their providers become injured, crippled or killed.

Plans have been completed by the state industrial commission for the transmission from optional to compulsory compensation for workmen.

Almost 17,000 private employers are now preparing to insure under the new law. The state and all its political subdivisions also must insure their employes.

"BILLY SUNDAY"

A Blasphemer.—He Says "The Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man is Rot Dug Out of Hell."

(Methodist Advocate.)

We recently published liberal extracts from a report of a committee of Methodist preachers of Columbus, O., which heartily endorsed Rev. W. A. Sunday, and his work. Now comes Dr. Washington Gladden, of the same city, one of the most prominent Congregational preachers in the United States, who publishes some serious words of objection to Evangelist Sunday. We quote here the main points of objection made by Dr. Gladden as published in the Congregationalist:

"The intolerance and violence which are the native breath of Mr. Sunday furnish the first and strongest reason for refusing to work with him. In his first or second day in Columbus Mr. Sunday said: 'The Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man is the worst rot that ever was dug out of hell, and every minister who preaches it is a liar.' I could hardly believe my eyes when I read it, but I made very sure that he said it, and the same thing was said in substance over and over. I do not wish to pass judgment on the ministers who listened without protest to that; I know what their excuses were; but I could not, without forfeiting my self-respect, have attended those services until those words had been withdrawn and humbly apologized for."

"Such language was repeated every day. Every man whose opinions differ from those of Mr. Sunday is a liar; every day he mounts the judgment seat of the universe and sends men by scores to the right hand and to the left—mostly to the left. Statistics of a sort—were kept of the number of 'conversions'; but of the number of 'conversions' by name, no record, I believe, was made. It is a great omission; for that is a large part of the business."

"All evolutionists are consigned to hell. Mr. Sunday names, one by one, those whom he supposes to be evolutionists, and with a dramatic gesture flings each of them into perdition. 'There goes old Darwin! He's in hell, sure!' And the enraptured audience yells its applause as one evolutionist after another is dropped into the fiery pit. A staid Methodist preacher, who watched this performance, said afterward: 'I would never have believed, if I had not seen it, that an audience of civilized Americans could show such a spirit as that.' The scene at a Spanish bull fight is really, when you think of it, less horrible."

"We are told that we must not criticize a man who is 'doing so much good.' These people shouting themselves hoarse as one evolutionist after another was dropped into hell were the people to whom, on that day, 'good' was being done; a few minutes afterward several hundred of them 'hit the sawdust trail,' and were numbered among the 'eighteen thousand.'"

CAPITOL GOSSIP.

Dr. J. N. McCormack, Representative from Bowling Green, is working on a bill for a uniform system of accounting, which he expects to introduce early in the session. It will provide for a uniform system to apply to every office in the Commonwealth—State, County Municipal and District, which handles or accounts for public funds. The system is to be under the supervision of a commission, composed of the State officials, and the State Inspector and Examiner at the termination of the terms of the incumbent is to be an expert accountant.
