MANY SAVED IN FIRE MEETING AT JACKSON, OHIO.

Jackson.—The revival services held in this city by the Fife brothers came to an end Sunday night. Eleven hundred and seventy-eight persons were converted, among them being Frank McLain, mayor of Jackson; Chief of Police Wallace Jacobs and Policeman Arthur Hood and Frank Patton, all of whom declared their intention of becoming members of one of the local churches. COMMON CARRIERS

Held Not To Be Liable For Damages Until Completion of Delivery.

Frankfort.—Common carriers are not liable in this State for damage to property until the delivery to the common carrier is completed. The Appellate Court so held, affirming the judgment of the Fayette Circuit Court in the case of W. Bush Nelson against The Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad Company.

Nelson was delivering hemp to the company, and had almost completed loading the car when it was damaged by fire. He sued to recover \$800 damages, but lost on the grounds that the delivery had not been completed.
