## GLOBE CIRCLING BALL TEAMS HOME AGAIN.

New York, March 6.—The world-grinding American baseball players came home today in a snowstorm. While harbor craft tooted and wharfs from the Federal League figuratively waved enticing contracts, the Giant-White Sox combination drew into quarantine shortly after 8 o'clock.

The Federal League representatives were unable to obtain passes to board the Lusitania to greet the travelers down the bay. Organized baseball was more fortunate in having obtained revenue cutter passes in advance, and a delegation was able to board the ship before she came to her pier.

## PRESIDENT BAN JOHNSON DECLARES WAR ON THE FEDERAL LEAGUE.

New York, March 6.—The Federal League must be exterminated. We will not countenance any arrangement of peace between organized baseball and these four-flushers and bluffers. The American League here-with declares war on the Federals and intends to go through to the finish.

In such vitriolic terms did Ban Johnson, President of the American League, make known yesterday for the first time the stand of the organized baseball crowd toward the independents.

If the idea is to bring about a peaceful settlement of the present trouble in baseball, the American League will put a stop to all negotiations.

Witness for Prosecution in One Case Pleads Guilty on Similar Charge and Is Convicted.

Lawrenceburg, Ky., March 6.—Prof. E. D. Burton, chief witness for the prosecution in the case of former Superintendent of Schools Baxter, who was acquitted of the charge of selling questions in advance of teachers' examinations, today pleaded guilty to a similar charge and made an eloquent plea to the court for mercy. He was given an intermediate sentence in the penitentiary of from two to five years. An effort will be made to secure a pardon from the Governor.
