The chair appointed Mrs. Dr. Franklin, Mrs. R. B. Lovel and Mrs. Barbour to decide what should be the time, and kind of entertainment given by the Central Parent-Teacher Association.

The association adjourned to meet at the usual time.

1,900 CIGARETTES IN WEEK

Record Claimed By Smoker Applying For Silver Cure.

That they, with one other young man, smoked 1,900 cigarettes during the past week, was the statement which Dr. Charles McDevitt, at the City Hospital, said was made to him yesterday by Allen Armstrong, 24, and Harry Prince, 19, both of 2914 Woodburn avenue, who applied for the nitrate of silver cure for the cigarette habit.

"This newspaper notoriety of the cure has made me so busy swabbing throats that I hardly have time for my duties," said Dr. McDevitt. Ten others applied for treatment before 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Several boys became frightened and ran, pursued by parents.

COUNTY UNIT BILL

Passes House By Vote of 72 to 22—Drops Score Heavily and The New 25 Per Cent Petition Act Is Put Up To Governor McCreary.

Frankfort, Ky., March 10.—The drys scored heavily today in the House, when the Frost county unit bill was passed by a vote of 72 to 22, and the Webb State-wide prohibition bill was made a special order for 11 o'clock Thursday morning. The Frost bill was called from the Rules Committee and put on its passage as soon as the special orders, that had been set before the Rules committee took charge, were disposed of.

The wet faction, being "miffed" over their defeat, called the State-wide bill from the Rules Committee to put it on its passage. Representative Judy, of Mt. Sterling, spokesman for the wets, called out the State-wide bill. It would have passed but for defects in the bill and it was made a special order so that these defects might be cured by the committee. The wets were defeated overwhelmingly as there were but three members of the Legislature from the rural districts who voted for the bill either in the Senate or the House. The 75 per cent bill passed the Senate two to one and the House three and a half to one.

INSURANCE FIGHT IS ON

State Board Orders Representatives of Companies To Appear—Licenses May Be Revoked.

Frankfort, Ky., March 10.—Notice was served by wire today by the State Insurance Rating board on the Royal of London, West Chester of New York, American of Newark and Pennsylvania of Philadelphia to appear before the board next Monday and show cause why their State licenses should not be revoked. These companies have informed the board that they have ceased to write business in Kentucky. The Niagara has canceled all its Kentucky agencies, and Chairman Ruby Laffoon has inquired whether that means withdrawal of its State license. For ten months after withdrawal companies are still amenable for court service served on the insurance commissioner, it is said. Chairman Laffoon said every company withdrawing will be held responsible for failure to make reports to the department, as required by its rules, and to furnish statements of the makeup of risks to the insured.
